Every year around this time there appears in the Student Council mail box a letter from Alabama University explaining all about a marvelous volume which contains the biographies of whoever is who on American campuses. (The term "marvelous" was advisedly. Last year's contained five Yeshiva boys') The usual procedure is for the President of Student Government to nominate those students who in his opinion most nearly fulfill requirements mentioned above. We in Yeshiva, however, were more democratic. Last year the Commentator asked the student body to express its opinion, which was confirmed by the Governing Board and was published in the 1955 edition of the volume. Presenting Yeshiva were Irving Ribner '37, president of Council, Mordecai L. Gabriel '37, Editor of the Commentator, Louis Rankin '37, editor of the Masada, Eleazer Coldman '37, managing editor of the Commentator, and Louis Werfel '37, secretary of council.

Dr. D. Macht Discovers Deadly Type of Poison

Dr. David I. Macht, Baltimore toxicologist and member of the faculty of Yeshiva College, discussed for the Baltimore News-Post the cause of death by poisoning which has recently taken fifty-five lives in this country.

Dr. Macht discussed the scientific phenomenon of "synergism" to which he attributed the poisoning. He explained the process as two drugs of low poisonous quality, alone, acquired a high poisonous quality when combined.

Debates With Columbia To Take Place Soon

Science Department of College Library Is Still Deficient

A determined effort to build up the science department of the library is now under way, Isaac Goldberg, librarian, announced today.

Dr. Arnold Lowan and Professor Jekuthiel Ginsburg have been the chief contributors to the science department in the past, and volumes have also been received from Dr. Meyer Atlas, of the Biology department; Dr. Alexander Freed, instructor of hygiene, and Professor Isaacs, head of the Science Department.

Figuring especially in the drive will be the Biology section, it was learned. Goldberg stressed the importance of faculty co-operation, especially on the part of the heads of the various science departments in making the campaign successful. It is expected that this will solve the problem of continued student requests for a fuller selection of reading material in this field.

Dr. Louis L. Snyder, recent addition to the faculty of social sciences, this week contributed four of his own volumes to the library. Dr. Leo Zippin, of the mathematics department, also contributed.

VITAL MEETING HELD BY POEL HAMIZRACHI

Cultural Plans Sponsored By Committee

A meeting of the executive committee of the local chapter of the Hapoel Hamizrachi was held last Sunday.

S. O. Y. ELECTIONS ARE VALIDATED BY COMMITTEE MEETING

Accusations Held To Be Incomplete Are Not Of Valid Merit

Submitting an ambiguous report of two sentences the special investigating committee of the S. O. Y. found insufficient evidence for validating the elections held last term.

The S. O. Y. Council in a stormy session, after unsuccessfully attempting to extract a more lucid explanation from the committee voted to accept the report as exoneration of Philip Tatz, against whom charges of intimidation had been made, and further ordered the Commentator to be informed of their decisions and to request an apology for unfavorable editorial comment.

The text of the report follows: "The investigation committee, after examining charges of intimidation brought by Mr. Shoop and individual voters against Mr. Tatz, thereby challenging the legality of the election of Mr. Neustein, hereby declares that it did not find substantiating evidence to invalidate the election of Mr. Neustein. The committee regrets however that a student to whom an important administrative function had been entrusted has taken such active part in the election of S.O. officers.

In discussing the disputed "substantiating evidence" in an interview with a Commentator reporter, Abel said, in the name of the committee, that there was evidence presented but that it was insufficient quantity to substantiate the charges to the point of invalidating the election.

Rabbi Petegorsky Concludes Analysis of Zionist Convention

(Last in a Series of Five)

London, England
October 26, 1937

These letters have been primarily concerned with the present political statics of the partition proposal. No analysis of partition itself has been attempted for an adequate discussion of its inadequacies must far exceed the limits of these columns. Similar consideration has rendered impossible any study of the various alternative policies that have been suggested in recent months. But the fact that the submission of alternatives is not necessarily fated to be an exhibition of wasted energy—dispite strenuous efforts to render it such—has already been indicated. I am moved to one final reflection.

The symbol has ever been a most potent weapon in subtly forcing men to confuse the shadow of their ideals with their substance. That rash, unconsidered acceptance of the bare, "content-less" forms of those things to which humanity has aspired, has been civilization's major tragedy. But the symbol nevertheless continues to weave its hypnotic spell over the minds of men; and millions, under its influence, laid down their lives to preserve for their descendants a democracy that existed in name tho hardly in fact.

Today, the "Jewish State" is being similarly dangled before our eyes... a cruel mockery of those hopes and aspirations we have cherished for centuries. (Continued on Page 3)

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WE APOLOGIZE

It is true that the committee which investigated into the charges of intimidation during the recent S.O.Y. elections was guilty of inexcusable folly in presenting a report so ambiguous that its implications could not be determined. We believe, however, that this mistake is completely dwarfed by the overwhelming absurdity of the S.O.Y. Council's action in undertaking to decide that the report constituted an exoneration of Mr. Tatz.

The report consisted of two vague statements: one to the effect that the committee did not believe it had "substantiating evidence" which could justify a re-election, the other voicing the committee's regret that a person having Mr. Tatz's administrative functions should have taken so active a part in the campaign.

Beyond the blank statement that its evidence did not suffice to invalidate Mr. Neustein's election, the report contained nothing to throw any light on the nature of the case for the contesting of the election. No mention was made of the specific evidence brought to the committee with regard to Mr. Tatz's campaigning. That his methods were not beyond reproach seems clearly indicated by the dolorous protestation against Mr. Tatz's participation in the campaign. Certainly, unless Mr. Tatz's administrative authority was manifestly felt during the election, the committee would not have seen fit to refer to it.

There is nothing whatsoever in the report which might be construed as an exoneration of Mr. Tatz. It states nothing beyond the fact that that evidence was insufficient to warrant a re-election. That does not mean that the evidence was insufficient to indicate that Mr. Tatz was involved in the type of campaigning charged to him.

It was charged that Mr. Tatz had intimidated Mr. Shoop into withdrawing his candidacy. The report does not say that this charge has been proven false.

It was charged that Mr. Tatz had campaigned in a manner calculated to inspire voters with fear of reprisal. Although the Election and Canvassing Committee stated that it failed to secure formal testimony to this effect, it is generally known that witnesses did appear before the new investigation committee. Did the committee state that this testimony was misleading or false?

...that such campaigning had been conducted. Did the new committee say anything to negate this?

It is unfortunate that the members of the committee failed to reveal to the council precisely what they meant by "lack of substantial evidence". This was a bad error in judgment. The action of the council was worse than that. It was inspired by the desire of a group of discredited politicians to make a technical victory the equivalent of a whitewash.

The committee has decided in favor of Mr. Neustein. We congratulate the new vice-president of the S.O.Y. and wish him the best of success in carrying out his duties. There is no reason why the mal-practices of certain of his supporters should be held against him.

The case against Tatz and Company is first opening however. It is now in the hands of the student body. The Yeshiva students are notoriously patient. For years they have endured the high-handed impositions of Mr. Tatz and his clique. They have allowed insidious nepotism to gain a stranglehold over the Yeshiva life. Now that these abuses are no longer subjects of vague dissatisfaction, but have been brought into the limelight through the events of the recent election it is inconceivable that the student body will remain silent much longer.

ALUMNI AFFAIR

From many points of view, the Alumni Theatre Party to be held on November 9, is a matter of importance. It has been planned as an affair in which alumni and undergraduates will work in close cooperation to attain a common goal. To this end Student Council has lent its sanction to the plan and has urged the individual classes to treat the party as they would their own class affairs.

The success of this theatre party must be assured for a healthy and active alumni is of prime importance to the future of Yeshiva College. We must realize that every effort we expend in supporting our alumni means in the final analysis that we are furthering our own cause.

It is true that the interest exhibited by the alumni of many colleges in the activities of the undergraduates and of the faculty has frequently been objectionable and unwelcome. But such instances have arisen where the alumni has proved reactionary in outlook and unsympathetic with the aims of the student body, and with the changes in outlook caused by a dynamic society.

Fortunately no such cleavage between the Yeshiva alumni and the undergraduates exists. Rather there is a feeling of complete harmony and similarity of purpose and ideals. Such feeling should be manifested overtly and should be demonstrated in a material way whenever possible. Cooperation with the alumni in assuring the success of the theatre party is one such instance, and a very important one.

The financial success of the undertaking, moreover, will undoubtedly mean that the activities of the college will derive a benefit. In fact the effort of the alumni association have been directed toward aiding various college functions, especially the college library, to the extent of its ability, and the scope of its aid has only been limited by financial dictates. Therefore, if we are interested in our own good and welfare and in the welfare of those college functions which are so essential to the well-being of any college, we should lend our full cooperation.

Not being able to attend any necessary openings during the weekend it was my woeful duty to sit by and listen to the Philharmonic Concert come over the ether. The nearest Schick-proof radio that I was able to locate was in the habitant of a Commentator critic of another day. His dramatic and balladistic antics executed in time with the fuge of Von Weber's "Euryanthe" overture, though slightly marring the reception, could not detract from the faultless performance of the orchestra.

Indeed, the program which Mr. Barbirolli chose was of the type which can bring out all the good points of such a fine orchestra. In addition to the Weber overture, the program consisted of Saint-Saens's "Le Rouet d'Omphale", Delius's "Dance Rhapsody" and as the closing number Brahms' First Symphony in C minor.

The Delius work which was new to many provided a worthy setting, based on variations of one major theme, for the orchestra to demonstrate its strength in the various instrumental groups. The finale of the dance showed the ability of the orchestra to co-ordinate in perfect timing—something they learned under Toscanini which Barbirolli attempts, with a great measure of success, to keep.

The same impregnable violin section which carried the dynamic finale of the dance to very fitting anti-climax, again proved its prowess in the second movement of the Brahms Symphony. After listening to the same movement played by two famous American orchestras in the last two weeks, one can truly learn to appreciate the excellence of the superior New York Philharmonic.

The tempo of the last movement brought back to mind Toscanini's masterful direction of this symphony in days gone by. After listening to Deems Taylor's intermission comments on the last movement, no one can any longer go about criticizing Brahms for directly "lifting" a

AUSTRALIA TIGHTENS CURBS ON JEWISH IMMIGRATION

CANBERRA, Australia (WNS) - Further Jewish immigration to Australia became extremely difficult when the department of the interior informed the Jewish Welfare Society, which handles Jewish immigrants, that henceforth all immigrants must have a certificate from a prospective employer guaranteeing that the job which the immigrant will get will not be depriving a native Australian of work. This new requirement is in addition to the previous regulation which provided that each immigrant must have \$250 and a guarantee from the Welfare Society that he will not become a public charge. The difficulty in obtaining certificates from employers is expected to reduce Jewish immigration considerably.

has as its platform, such meaningless and phrase-mongering platitudes as "Social Justice" and Utopian Socialism, has many elements which smack of Fascism and Revisionism (who support Franco) as Compulsory Arbitration, which outlaws all labor strikes, the only weapon of workers against the exploration of the capitalists, Compulsory Arbitration, which finds among its staunch supporters such "renowned" figures as Hitler, Mussolini, and Jabotinsky, is very stupidly justified by Hapoel Hamizrachi as a necessity in Palestine, because, they claim, one must build the country without being hampered and annoyed by strikes, although statistics show that the proportion of labor strikes in Palestine is among the smallest in the world. Compulsory Arbitration in Germany, Italy and Cuba means the complete subjugation of the workers. No stupid rationalization can change such obvious facts. The "theological" approach of "live and let live", which is characteristic of every approach of the Hapoel Hamizrachi to politics and economics, leads its leaders to openly praise the Corporate State of Italy. To them strikes

may mean violence. Most who...
 The time has come for the Hapoel Hamizrachi to choose for itself leaders who are truly labor conscious and who would lead the Jews into a United Front with the underpaid and cruelly exploited Arabs, for a struggle against the Arab landlords and absentee landlords, against Jewish Capitalists, and against British Imperialism, which utilizes "Divide and Rule" to play off Arabs against Jews. Let us stop picketing Jewish employers employing Arab labor. Such policies only incite the Arab against the Jew, and thus end in riots and pogroms. Let us unionize the Arabs in the Histadruth, not separately in Jim Crow Unions, nor in the dual unions of the Hapoel Hamizrachi. That would strengthen Jewish and Arab labor, by abolishing the competition of cheap Arab labor, by making the labor union larger and stronger, and by bringing us into more and friendlier relations with Arabs, by increasing the Arab wages 50% (for Arabs are paid today 50% less than Jewish labor).
 The present activity of the Hapoel Hamizrachi is a blot on Orthodox Jewry which will be catastrophic to Judaism unless remedied immediately.
