

## CHANOVER HEADS STUDENT BODY; MANDELCORN COMMENTATOR EDITOR

### Rosenthal, Karp Stay On Board; Sokolow New Addition

Ephraim F. Mandelcorn '41, present managing editor of the "Commentator," will replace Hyman C. Chanover '41, former editor-in-chief and president-elect of Student Council for the year 1940-41, the incumbent governing board announced yesterday.

Julius Rosenthal '42 will occupy the position of managing editor, while Abraham Karp '42 and Joseph Sokolow '42 are to serve in the capacities of news editor and sports editor respectively.

For the first time in the history of the "Commentator," the governing board announced the formation of an associate board, consisting of a feature editor, a publicity manager and the assistant business manager. Morris Epstein '42 has been appointed to the position of feature editor and David Mirsky '42 assumes the duties of publicity manager.

Mandelcorn, a native of Montreal, was chosen for the editorship after serving on the "Commentator" for three years, the last year as managing editor.

Julius Rosenthal, a resident of Baltimore, who assumes the position now held by the incoming editor, was the recipient of the Feuerstein award in his freshman year. Having been the news editor this year, Rosenthal has the distinction of rising from the associate news staff to the position of governing board in his sophomore year. Among other things he has served as manager of the tennis team and a member of the freshman debating squad.

Abraham Karp will occupy the position vacated by Rosenthal, as news editor. Karp was appointed to the governing board of "Commentator" last year while only a sophomore, as sports editor. Along with his participation on the intra-mural championship basketball team, he is a member of the varsity tennis team.

Joseph Sokolow, vice-president of the sophomore class, will assume the duties of sports editor in place of Abe Karp. A resident of Colchester, Conn., and a graduate of Bacon Academy in 1936, he was a

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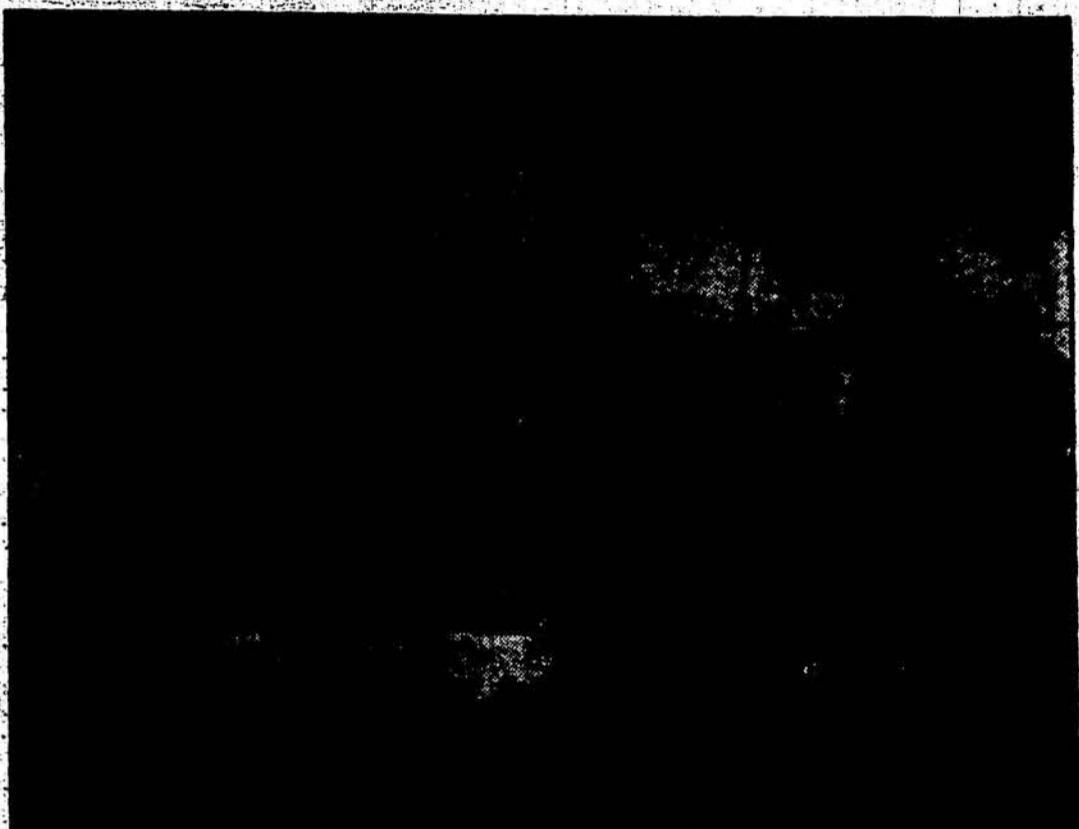
### CLASS EXECUTIVES CHOSEN FOR '40-'41

### PERLMUTTER, KRA TO LEAD REL. SOC.

Oscar Perlmutter '42, Aaron Kra '41, and David Miller '42, were elected president, vice president and secretary respectively of the International Relations Club for the coming year. The announcement was made by Kra, present secretary of the group.

From the same source it was also learned that the calendar of events for the coming year would constitute a departure from last year's schedule. A minimum of twelve meetings will be held, eight of which will be devoted to prominent speakers and the remainder to round table discussions. Doctor Margolish, assistant professor of Political Science will act in the capacity of chairman of the latter.

Kra also revealed that all ex-governing board members of the society remaining in the institution next year will act as advisors to the group. Suggestions from the student body as to the manner of conducting future meetings will be welcomed by the incoming officers.

### Council Will Join S. O. Y. To Study Dining Room Ills

A motion to appoint a joint Student Council-S. O. Y. committee, which is to have complete power in all difficulties arising in cafeteria affairs, was passed at a special Student Council meeting held last night. The committee will consist of four members, who will be appointed by the president.

A report delivered by Jacob Bronstein '40, chairman of a Student Council committee investigating the possibility of a student cooperative cafeteria, was unanimously accepted and an appropriation of \$5 to defray the costs of the above committee was passed.

Commenting on the creation of the joint Dining-Room Committee, Jacob Goldman, president of Student Council, stated, "It is to be hoped that the proposal will make for a better administration of the cafeteria problems, not as in the past where there was no centralized body whatsoever to cope with any arising situation or with the problem of hiring caterers."

### Election Assembly Hears Candidates

#### Platforms Are Presented, Issues Discussed

In a pre-election assembly held on Monday, May 13, in the Harry Fischel Synagogue, candidates for Student Council offices presented their platforms to a large body of student voters.

Candidates presented by Irving Koslowe '40, chairman of the Election and Canvassing Committee included, Hyman C. Chanover '41 of Brooklyn, N. Y., candidate for the presidency who affirmed his confidence in the full support of the student body, which, he believed, would "get at the kernel of things" and give him a vote of confidence.

Pincus Dachowitz '41 of Brooklyn, New York, opposing presidential nominee, criticized the policies of the past administration and asked for the opportunity to demonstrate his own abilities in an executive position.

Candidates for the vice-presidency who spoke, included Leonard Azneer '41 of Philadelphia, Penn., Leonard Devine '41 of the same city, Meyer Heller '41 of Brooklyn, New York, and Irwin Isaacson '41 of Seattle, Wash.

Milton Kramer '43 of Brooklyn, New York, and Gabriel Schonfeld '41 of the Bronx, who competed for the athletic manager's post, delivered were followed by the secretarial aspirants in the persons of Jack Ackerman '41 of Brooklyn, New York, Aaron Kra '41 of Boston, Mass., and Eli Sar '41 of Manhattan, each of whom promised to bring with him a degree of maximum efficiency to the post of secretary.

### Other Offices Go To Isaacson, Kramer and Ackerman

Carrying every class by a considerable plurality, Hyman C. Chanover '41, was elected president of Student Council for the year 1940-41 in the annual poll for student representatives which was held last Tuesday. Those chosen to fill other Council offices were Erwin Isaacson '41, to the vice-presidential position, Jack Ackerman '41, as secretary, and Milton Kramer '42, as athletic manager.

Chanover, who resigned from the editorship of the "Commentator" in order to be eligible for office, had little difficulty in defeating his only opponent, Pincus Dachowitz '41. Although not obtaining an actual majority in any class, Chanover received his strongest support from the Senior and Freshman classes, each of which gave him a plurality of eleven electoral votes, while in each of the Junior and Sophomore classes he drew a plurality of eight votes over his opponent to make the total 105-67. The president-elect will succeed Jacob E. Goldman '40, also a former member of the "Commentator" governing board.

In the race for vice-president, a total of three ballots, rated according to the proportional representation system, was needed before Isaacson could eliminate his three opponents, to win with 119 votes out of a total of 170. Azneer was the first to drop out, leaving Devine and Heller trailing behind Isaacson. Devine followed Azneer, while in the third and final ballot the tally stood Isaacson 119, Heller 51.

It was in the battle for secretary that the only reversal of votes occurred after the first ballot. With Kra leading by a margin of four votes, Ackerman forged ahead in the second ballot to come in first with the final tally 87-81.

Kramer, the athletic-manager-elect, made a clean sweep in every class but one, the '41 men giving the margin to their classmate, Gabriel Schonfeld. This could not stem the tide, however, and Kramer won easily, 117-59.

The new officers will be inducted, together with the other members of

Rabbi Meyer Kimmel has been appointed director of placement of the Yeshiva, it was announced yesterday.

In this capacity he will be in charge of distribution of positions for communities throughout the country to ordained rabbis of the Yeshiva.

The bureau will also follow the activities of Yeshiva graduates in an effort to secure advancement of promising rabbis to higher positions, according to the new director.

Rabbi Kimmel, who was ordained at the Yeshiva in 1935, received his B.A. from C.O.N.Y. in the same year, and an LL.B. from N.Y.U. in 1936. At present he is the spiritual leader of the Inwood Jewish Center.

### "If There Is No Flour . . ."

The perennial bane in the life of the Yeshiva student, and especially the dormitory student, has long been the dining-room question. No one will doubt that he is more concerned and has more at stake than any other in what changes or what set-ups are brought about with regard to the dining-room.

It is the student, no matter which department he attends, that is the almost exclusive patron of the cafeteria. It is the student who, because of the stipend set-up, is compelled to patronize the dining-room.

Yet in the past his opinion has been ignored and his wishes disregarded whenever any policy was formulated or change made in that department. Thus the party most affected was least consulted and was left without a voice in a matter which was of concern almost to him alone.

This charge does not imply that the matter, as it has been conducted heretofore, was wilfully mismanaged or maliciously administered against the express interests of the student body, although there were times when abiding by student wishes could, as later events testified, have obviated embarrassing results. Yet the very existence of such a situation is to all intents and purposes an inequitable and unjust condition.

It was for this reason that at a special meet-

ing last night the Student Council passed a motion to form with the S. O. Y., a joint committee for the purpose of expressing the organized students' position on any steps to be taken in the cafeteria matter.

That some definite step must be taken on this question goes almost without saying. The uncertain vicissitudes through which the dining-room has passed have created a condition which is well nigh impossible. This is a matter which must be settled definitely if the general welfare of the student body is to be maintained.

A serious study of all the possibilities and their relative merits should by all means be undertaken. Comparative analysis of the situations in other institutions with comparable problems should be made and the results judiciously weighed. This, of course, is the function of any committee studying this problem.

What is important is an immediate application to the question. The urgency of the problem makes immediate action imperative.

What, however, is at least as important is a genuine regard for the will of the student body as it is expressed by student leaders. It is the student who has most at stake and it is he whose interests are to be given foremost consideration.

This can be done only through a committee fully empowered by the entire student body. Its voice must be heard. It is the only just way and hence the only successful way.

### Now They Will Be Placed

News of the appointment of Rabbi Meyer Kimmel as director of placement for the Yeshiva comes as a most gratifying surprise.

The problem of stationing graduates of the Rabbinical department in suitable posts has long been a perplexing one. There was first to consider the fact that, after long years of assiduous toil with the anxiety and mental anguish surrounding the final examination, the graduate was often left almost on his own in procuring a post. The fact that there was no single centralized agency to provide for the graduate rabbi leaving the institution resulted at least in a very unhealthy attitude on his part toward everything about him.

But looking from a larger point of view, such a condition was an unquestioned detriment to Orthodox Jewry at large. If Yeshiva is to wield the influence which it can and should wield in the Jewish world, it must do more than wait to be called upon. It is the calling of Yeshiva to take the initiative, to go forth and proselytize—to proselytize Jews to our Jewish tradition.

Yeshiva-graduated rabbis have the desire and ability to assume this spiritual leadership of traditional Jewry. But the lack of facilities in placing them deprived them of the opportunity of putting these assets to their maximal usefulness.

The present move, therefore, to organize a bureau under the competent supervision of Rabbi Kimmel must be hailed as a large stride forward in expanding the domain of Yeshiva influence and as a harbinger of great accomplishment in the future.

The highlight of the tournament was the victory of the "Amboys" Joe Peysner '43 and Murray Letner '43 over a Drew doubles team of Dave Hirsch and Jimmy Boyd 6-4, 2-6, 6-3.

In the first singles match, Sol Aber '40 fell prey to the drives and smashes of Arlo Hultsch 6-0, 6-1. The rest of the singles was a repetition of the first. Murray Hinchin '40 dropped both sets to John Hultsch, 6-1, 6-1. Captain Bard fared no better than to Arthur Levitt, 6-1, 6-0. Joe Peysner '43 dropped his match to Dave Lightbourne 6-1, 6-0, with Al Salkowitz '43 number five man losing a close first to Bill Scvill 9-7 and a hard fought second 6-3.
