



Mr. Celnik, college librarian reminds students of the following rules now in effect in the Stern College library:

1. Library hours are from 9-10 on Monday through Thursday, -12 on Friday, and 12-5 on Sunday.

To borrow a book, the book card found on the inside back cover must be signed and a date-due card obtained for each book borrowed. A student who takes a book without having it properly charged is subject to a fine of \$5.00 or suspension from classes.

There is no limit on the num ber of books a student may borrow at any given time. A fine of 10 cents per day per book is charged for each book returned late

Books from the stacks will be permitted to circulate for period of two weeks, provided there is no request for them. If a student wishes to take out a book which is in circulation, she may request it whereupon the book may be called in at the end of the week.

5. Certain books which contain required readings are kept on reserve. Students who wish to use a reserve book in the library after 6 p.m. will sign for it in advance on the day they intend to use it. If there is no request for it, the book may be taken out at 6 p.m. for overnight use. However, this does not apply to single copof books that are used by both Stern College and the Teacher's Institute for Women. Reserve books must be re-turned before 9 a.m. the day after they are borrowed. Failure to return these books on time incurs a fine of 25 cents for the first half hour, and 25 Judy Fink '63 Rabbi Ari Eiger cents for every hour there- Marilyn Gottlieb '64 to Steve after.

6. Reserve books may be taken out of the library for one hour during the day provided the student obtains permission from the librarian or his assistants. There will be a fine of \$1.00 per book for books overdue more than 10 minutes

7. Fines are to be paid immediately upon return of the overdue book. Students who do not have money to pay for the fine may borrow from the Student Loan Fund at the office of the Dean of Students

8. Reserve books are to be not circulate among the students
