Lucas Claims Criminals Are Diseased Men

An interesting study of crime and criminals was presented to the students of Yeshiva University by Mr. Edwin Lucas last Tuesday evening, March 17, in Riets Hall. This was the first in a series of lectures to be sponsored by the social works department under the able direction of Mr. Heimlich, lecturer in sociology at Yeshiva College, who was the chairman of the evening. Mr. Lucas is the executive director of the Society for the Prevention of Crime, and the man responsible for much of the liberal welfare legislation in New York state.

The famed criminologist offered a detailed analysis of the factors that cause people to break the law. He debunked the old notions that crime is due to exposure to poverty, drinking of coffee, possessing bad teeth, etc. Mr. Lucas admitted that these physical factors may contribute to the behavior of people, but they are not the principal causes of crime.

New Treatment Urged

He asserted that criminal behavior results from a product of economic, social, and psychological backgrounds of the individual. In emphasizing the psychological factor in crime, he said, "We don't care about the facts, but what the criminal thinks the facts are."

Mr. Lucas considers criminals in the same category as sick people and demands that they must be treated as such. The criminologist dramatically concluded with this pungent remark: "As long as we punish criminal behavior, we'll always have crime. When we begin treating crime as a disease then we'll begin to make substantial progress in this so-far unsuccessful fight against crime."

Mr. Hurwitz Given "Oscar" For Magic

Mr. Abraham B. Hurwitz, assistant professor of physical education at Yeshiva College, known to countless youngsters in the metropolitan area as "Peter Pan The Magic Man," has been awarded the Supreme Knights Medal for "outstanding contributions in the field of magic." The award, presented annually by the world renowned magician, Cardini, is generally acclaimed as the "Oscar" of the magic world.

In addition to his duties as an entertainer, Mr. Hurwitz has contributed articles on magic and health recreation to several leading publications.

Heads Sundry Activities

While specializing in magic for children, he has nevertheless entertained adult audiences with his lecture series on magic, and has organized a troupe of entertainers which has been touring the veterans' hospitals in this area.

Besides his duties as a physical education instructor at Yeshiva, Mr. Hurwitz is the chairman of the Faculty-Students Relations Committee and the Faculty Advisor on varsity athletics.

Dedicate Current Issue Of Talploth To Famous Rabbi

Rabbi Samuel K. Mirsky, editor of Talploth, a quarterly devoted to Jewish laws and ethics, announced that the forthcoming issue will be dedicated to the fiftieth anniversary of the death of Rabbi Isaac Elchanan, of sainted memory. Accordingly, a comprehensive survey of his life and creative activity will be presented.

"Rabbi Isaac Elchanan and Rabbi Israel Salanter" will be the topic of an article by Rabbi Yehuda Lev Ginsberg, of Denver, Colorado. A treatise by Yeruchem Leiner on a hitherto anonymous book which has recently been proven to be the work of Rabbi Isaac Elchanan, will also be presented. An over-all view of his life will be featured in an article by Rabbi Mirsky.

Many Scholars Contribute

Continuing the policy which has made Talploth the central organ for Talmudic literature in the world, "The Commentaries on Talmud Yerushalmi" by Rabbi Ben Zion Uziel, chief Sephardic rabbi of Palestine, will be resumed. An important article dealing with the laws of "agumah" will also be published.

Among several other scholars contributing to this issue may be listed Dr. Isaiah Wolfberg and Rabbi Pinchos Epstein, both of Jerusalem, and several of our own Roehel HaYeshiva.

Rabbi Mirsky revealed that many requests for Talploth were received from Jews in D.P. camps, and many copies have been sent overseas gratis, in answer to these requests.

To express its indignation at the anti-Jewish policy of Great Britain, the S.O.Y. passed unanimously at its last meeting a motion to actively support a boycott of British products and firms in conjunction with Betar.

An S.O.Y. and Betar sponsored demonstration in Times Square to publicize the boycott will be held on Saturday night, March 30, at 8:00 p.m. The march will commence at Bryant Park, 42nd St. and 6th Ave.

Every Yeshiva student is urged to join the demonstration so as to make this vital action a success.

Captain Gamzon Speaks At Yeshiva

Maquis Leader Seeks Volunteers To Help Re-educate French Youth

Students and friends of Yeshiva University filled Riets Hall to capacity Tuesday evening, March 11, to welcome Captain Robert Gamzon, the leader of the Jewish Maquis of France. Charles Spira '47, president of the French Club, which sponsored the affair, introduced Captain Gamzon, who has recently completed a tour of the United States on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal.

Dean, Faculty O.K. New Requirements

Dean Moses L. Isaacs has announced that at a recent faculty meeting simplified foreign language, Hebrew and Bible requirements were approved.

Beginning with the academic year 1946-47, incoming freshmen will be required to take only two years of Hebrew instead of Bible and Jewish history, and only one year of Jewish history will be required. Henceforth, Bible will be given under the jurisdiction of the Yeshiva department, Dean Sar taking charge, and will not be entered on the student's college record. Seniors however, will be able to take an advance elective course in Bible for credit.

Another innovation next year will be the simplified language requirements. Two years of a language, other than Hebrew, will be necessary for graduation. The elementary or 01 courses will meet four hours a week instead of the present five.

Captain Gamzon explained that the Jewish Maquis of World War II was an outgrowth of the pre-war Jewish scout movement in France, of which he was a founder. During the early part of the Vichy regime, the Jewish scouts were rated officially on the same par as the other scouts, but had little confidence in Petain, for understandable reasons. They formed schools for vocational guidance and agricultural centers in order to "Be Prepared."

Capture German Prisoners
The Germans were wantonly kidnapping Jewish children from the scout centers in order to pack their deportation trains. As a result, in 1944, the Jewish scouts were obliged to blow up these centers and go into hiding. The boys didn't relish the idea of cowardly hiding from their enemies and decided to form the Jewish Maquis.

Captain Gamzon commanded a group of two hundred Maquis that single-handedly attacked and took thirty-five hundred prisoners. He smiled as he said, "It was a pleasure to tell them that we were Jews."

Religious Life Described
The commander of the French Jewish youth described in detail the religious life in the Jewish agricultural centers. He considered the accomplishments performed in the religious field more important than the military activities. Throughout the war there was a great scarcity of food, that forced the hungry children to make superhuman efforts in working, tilling, and farming the fields. This contact with nature instilled in the scouts a new conception of the meaning of a Jewish life. The traditional benedictions at the partaking of the food which their own hands produced were said with new-found fervor and devotion.

Dr. Linn, assistant professor of English at Yeshiva College, read for Captain Gamzon an inspiring message concerning "Shabat" life in the agricultural centers. To help demonstrate the religious and cultural life of these scouts more clearly, slides were shown and recordings of their liturgical and secular songs were played.

Captain Gamzon concluded with an urgent appeal to the students of Yeshiva to voluntarily go to France for a few years to help educate the Jewish children and orphans. "You are rabbinical students. We need rabbis—good ones. If you want to serve, you have a big job before you. You can give a part of your lives; others have given their whole lives. We need boys with a good Jewish background. The few thousand left must be educated!"

leaders of pro-Franco rallies in 1939. Mr. Timone denies being a Fronter, but to date has not repudiated nor denied that he did sponsor these meetings along with such characters as Edward Lodge Curran, Merwin K. Hart, Allen Zoll, etc. A speaker at one of these meetings was the infamous Martin Dies.

Timone in himself is a menace, and as such the American Jewish Congress protested his appointment. But not one responsible organization (with the exception of PM) has had the guts to state bluntly the danger implicit in the appointment, and that is, the selection of a man to occupy a city position primarily because of his religion. Jewry Unconcerned

We are allowing ourselves to be lulled into false security by depending on the same types of individuals who soothed French, German, and Polish Jewry. I could never reconcile myself to the "hands off" policy which our institution has assumed in regards to Zionism, but perhaps there is a question of partisanship involved there. Certainly, however, no "partisanship" can be allowed to interfere in the battle against anti-Semitism. All other organizations have proven themselves incompetent or unable to tackle the problem. If the Fordham University alumni could see fit to align itself with fascists and defend May Quinn, why didn't the Rabbinical Council, for example, deem it their duty to add its prestige to those fighting her? These events occurred in New York City where the preponderant amount of Synagogues are orthodox and that is why orthodoxy must take the initiative.

Yeshiva has become the first and only Jewish university in the country and as such it must not shirk the responsibilities that its position entails. Building a university has no significance if we continue to isolate ourselves from events that occur around us.

Anti-Semitism Threat Finds No Unified Jewish Defense

In spite of the latest Roper report that anti-Semitism is at a standstill, two events have occurred during the past few weeks which have brought joy and solace to all the fascists in our city. To add to the general rout, the Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai Brith suddenly withdrew from the fight against "The Daily News" causing general demoralization in the campaign against fascism and anti-Semitism in New York City.

Quinn rallies. The Fordham University alumni played a major role in her defense. On the other side were aligned a galaxy of civic, labor, and Jewish groups, but without any real central organization to direct the prosecution. The result was a melodramatic, but inept handling of the case. Two of the three people conducting the trial seemed anxious to close the affair and were rejecting pertinent evidence as being irrelevant. The evidence was finally entered on the record, but only after prolonged protests by the public and the press.

May Quinn Whitewash

Miss Quinn was acquitted by the Board of Education on a vote of five to one, on all counts but one. The lone dissenter, Mr. James Marshall, son of the late Louis Marshall, pointed out that even if she were guilty on only one count, she must be guilty all the way. Her only punishment was to pay a fine of two months pay. Actually she received two months pay gratis, as she was suspended for four months.

To heap insult upon injury, Miss Quinn has been merely transferred to another school in the same assembly district. A group of mothers are picketing the school daily, but at times they are subjected to heaps of refuse and vile abuse hurled at them from passing cars. The only legal recourse now is to have the Superintendent of Schools ask the State Education Commissioner to review the case, or to have the mayor request the Superintendent of Schools to do so. But one can hardly expect this, as Mr. O'Dwyer, while a candidate for mayor, dodged the issue by pretending ignorance of the case. I am inclined to believe that at least some of the mayor's advisors read the papers if not Mr. O'Dwyer himself. One might think they are as ignorant as they profess to be, if we are to judge by some of the mayor's recent actions and particularly some of his appointments.

O'Dwyer Selects Timone

Immediately after the Quinn case, Mr. O'Dwyer selected George A. Timone from a list of candidates submitted by the New York Catholic Archdiocesan headquarters to the Board of Education.

The newspaper PM published a story that Timone had been a co-sponsor with Christian Front

The May Quinn case has become a "cause celebre" in the fight to ferret out bigotry in the school system of the largest city in the world, whose Jewish population is roughly one-third of that of the entire city. The case had dragged along for two years, with executives of the Board of Education extending themselves to avoid facing the issue and to protect Miss Quinn. It was only after determined protests by labor and civic organizations that Miss Quinn was finally brought to a departmental trial.

Fronters Aid Quinn

Miss Quinn was charged with uttering several anti-Semitic and un-American statements in her Junior High School civics class in the Bensonhurst section of Brooklyn. These remarks reached some of the other teachers and parents. A complaint against her was lodged but only because of pressure by the parents, labor and civic organizations, Assemblyman Phillip Schupler, and other individuals, did Superintendent of Schools Wade finally order a trial.

To Miss Quinn's side rallied all the professional reactionary "haters" of the city. Father Edward Lodge Curran, Coughlin's top lieutenant in the East, assorted Christian Fronters, and the Brooklyn Tablet, official Catholic publication in Brooklyn, arranged May
