New Inventions



New Dugel School Broadens Yeshiva

Bowing to co-education, Yeshiva University, the only Jewish university in Washington Heights, will launch the Harriet Dugel School of Lower Studies, the President announced. The new school has been financially secured by an endownment of fifteen dollars, the President asserted, indicating that "this munificent gift" will assure the printing of letterheads.

The President's reversal of opinion on the subject of co-education, observers believe, was prompted by the contribution of Mrs. Dugel, whom the President balled as "anyhow, a nice wessan". Courses for "Rebblings" will be instituted. Mrs. J. H. Looksee will lecture on the Sociology and Political Theory of Ladies Auxiliary tees and Mrs. Leo Old wil teach Gossip Ethics.

Meeting in plenary session at Pacific City, Old Jersey, The Agudath Hamisnagdin, on last Pebruary 30, almost unanimously agreed to ban all dramatic productions at Yeshiva College. The vote was regarded by observers to be a major victory for Big Chief Mismaged Tarnish, who halled the decision as "being in line with our tradition of opposing all progress wherever possible."

The Misnagdim previously passed several resolutions whose effect undoubtedly will be felt by no one. After shedding the traditional tears for 6,000,000 dead, the Committee on Relief reported that the organisation should oppose, or be indifferent to, all relief programs not enjoying their "hechsher", and condemned all skeptics who doubted those funds under its control or influence.

The question of Palestine was brought up from the floor, but the chair ruled a discussion on the matter out of order. He explained that the constitution of the organization did not recognize that such a place existed, and therefore the individual members might take a hint and support Zionism only where the temper of their community warranted it.



Then the report on dramatics was presented by the A.H.S.C.I.H. (Agudath Hamisnagidm Special Committee To Investigate Heresy). At the expense of much learning, the committee had found that dramatics at Yeshiva was hurting the morale of the boys at some of the minor Brooklyn institutions. When they came to see the show, they discovered that there was such a thing as a college. Such incentives as higher stipends and laxer "Minyon" attendance had led them to abandon Bedford Avenue on Friday nights.

The committee, of course, had never seen a production but had found all rumous to be authentic. There was a chain of tradition strutching from the Manhattan to the Brooklyn side of the Williamsburg Bridge to youch for it. Having this as a basis, it had found no need to call for witnesses to defend the dramatic production, nor did they see the script. By the restore margin of two votes, the sensing voted down a restinction to burn the script and exconnectations.

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Purine Edition

There was a time when the Purim edition was part of "Commentator" tradition. But, war shortages led us to discontinue publishing them. Even now, we find it impossible to obtain the traditional colored paper which differentiated the Purim edition from all others. We had originally planned on devoting more space to the Purim edition but have been forced to eliminate some of the planned features in order to properly publicize the smicha convocation and the relief drive campaign.

While on the subject of Purim, Governing Board finally has found the real reason for the ban on dramatics at Yeshiva. Finding dramatics inconsistent with Judaism, the administration has found the movies an acceptable substitute. Having imported a Hollywood photographer and a professional director, the school officials proceeded to steal the scenes from the students who filled in as "extras". We are sure that the picture about Yeshiva will win the academic award for the best comedy of the year.

Relief Drive

In the past years when relief drives were announced, The Commentator heartily endorsed them. If the Governing Board had been asked whether there should have been a special drive in Yeshiva for funds to be sent to Europe this year, our attitude would have been a negative one. But since the the formal announcement has been made, The Commentator, with the consent of the Executive Council, will support the venture, if certain conditions will be met.

We regret very much that this drive must coincide with the opening of the United Jewish Appeal. We regret that relief has become a political weapon which is being used as a bait for the unfortunate homeless. It is unfortunate that the orthodox institutions can not find some way of merging with the Joint Distribution Committee, thus eliminating duplication in expenses and in field work.

But in spite of all the benefits that might accrue from joint action, we are cognizant of the fact that thousands of orthodox Jews will not have the minimum essentials during the approaching Passover holidays. And even if the utopia of two or more Jewish organizations is ever realized, it will come too late to be of immediate aid.

Now we face the problem of deciding to which organizations the money will be given. The fact that we are running a separate appeal indicates clearly that the funds will be distributed through orthodox agencies only. The Commentator favors giving 75% of the funds to the Mizrachi and Hapoel Hamizrachi. In spite of our repeatedly stated position that the policy of the Agudath Israel in relation to Palestine is detrimental to the best interest of Judaism, their welfare work in Europe is another matter and we urge that they receive the other 25%. We are uncompromisingly opposed to giving the organization known as the Vaad Hatzalah even a penny of the funds.

We came to this conclusion after considering the needs of the various organizations and their merits. We eliminated the Vaad Hatzalah on the grounds that while it was set up on a non-partisan basis, and all groups contributed money to it, the funds were distributed on a partisan basis. The Agudah set up its own fund some time ago. But it was not until the last Zionist congress that the Mizrachi organizations contacted their European "chaverim" and came back with unfavorable reports on the Vaad Hatzalah and the religious Zionists. The funds are limited. We feel they are most urgently needed by the Mizrachists. Our suggestion about the Agudah is based on the merit of their work. We also believe that the reputations of these organizations are surety bonds on the efficient distribution of the funds.

Once again British crysity and indifference to human suffering have shown their ugly faces. Foreign Secretary Bevin's latest remarks on Palestine carried the same anti-Semitic ring as those he made about the American elections. With typical English frigidity he calmly forgets the pledges of his party during the last quarter of a century and even his own statements of only two years past as he proceeds to explain American sympathy for those who survived the Nazi horrors as resulting from pre-election pressure.

Somewhow the protests and demands of American leaders had an artificial ring to them. The White House statement, of course, was inevitable, but it didn't come with the spontaneity that might emphasize America's stand and add support to General Marshall, who reportedly has requested the British government to allow 100,000 Jews to enter the Promised Land. Although Senators Brewster and Taft loudly denounced Bevin's alibi, Senator Vandenberg, Republican leader on foreign policy, is still strangely silent. The Republicans have been in power long enough to make good their campaign promises, and the sooner the better.

Coupled with the Bevinian insult, comes the story that British troops invaded Jeshurun Synagogue in Jerusalem, opposite the bombed officers' club, and defiled the sacred curtain. We shudder when we think what the world would do if an insane Jew battered down the altar of a church. Christian mercy and justice are just concepts for preachers to use in sermons but are seldom practiced. Britain's universal imperialism has already stretched her available manpower to the extent that she has been forced to ask American aid for her venture in Greece. This request must be rejected as it has never been American policy to support fascism, monarchial or otherwise.

Blood never ceases to flow in the British empire and America must not place itself in the position of filling the blood baths in Palestine, Greece, or India. To paraphrase a famous British author, "Justice, thou art fled to British beasts".

However, from Palestine itself comes the best news possible. Reliable reports state that the Hagana, Irgun and Stern gang are coming together. If true, it will take all the king's horses and all the king's men to defeat a people whose historical future is pre-ordained to be a glorious one.



Lookstein Lauds Mexico Education

Flying home after a three week trip to Mexico under the aegis of the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein praised the Jewish educational system in the capitol city as proportionately superior to that of the United States. The rabbi left his pulpit at Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun in the middle of January and, traveling with his wife, spoke in three languages—Yiddish, Hebrew, English-before a dozen audiences in Mexico City and its environs, bringing a message from the Displaced Persons he'd seen a year earlier. The J.D.C. is conducting a campaign in the southern republic.



"Here only twenty percent of Jewish children receive any kind of Jewish education," said the assistant professor of sociology. "In Mexico the percentage is something like fifty to sixty." Rabbi Lookstein revealed that the Jewish Community of Mexico City has days schools only. "There are three: religious-nationalist; Yiddish, non-religious non-nationalist; Hebrew, non-religious but nationalist." The rabbi tempered his approbation by deploring the insufficiency of time for Hebrew studies. Also, a lack of adjustment by those who had emigrated, notably in the linguistic field, could estrange the younger generation, Rabbi Lookstein warned. .

S. C. Puttibus For Publication Fund

President Beltin will be asked to establish a publication fund, to help substitute The Masmid, La Plambean, and other student publications, by Student Council. At a meeting held Petrusy 26, it was decided to request a permanent fund, from which monies would be drawn whenever needed.

Also pasted was a resolution urging Dr. Belkin to take steps to rectify defects in Yeshiva's health service system. Reports from the Health and Dormitory Committees revealed several infractions of elementary health and safety laws.

The report from the Metropolitan Intercollegiate Student Council stated that a delegate will be sent to Albany to lobby for the Austin-Mahoney bill which, if passed, would help end discrimination in education.

The Student Council voiced disapproval of the permission granted five new students to enter the college without attending classes in either the Yeshiva or the Teacher's Institute. The matter will be brought up at the next Faculty-Student Relations Committee.


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
