Elias and Salamon were









COMMENTATOR EDITORS RESIGN

Entire Staff Replaced by Barnyard Animals

In a letter to Yeshiva University strongman Sheldon J. Socol, Alex J. Traiman and Aaron J. Klein announced that they would discontinue publication of the Commentator effective February 30th. The letter, dated "Desember (sic) eleventeenth" cited various reasons for the decision. Most notable were the





The deal, effective immediately, will hopefully raise sinking Commentator circulation which has dipped below 100, according to Co Editor-in-Chief Alex Traiman.


