# ■ MIKEY BUTLER, A 2001 GRADUATE OF YESHIVA

College, passed away on Jan. 28 after a lifelong battle with cystic fibrosis. Mr. Butler's courage in the face of his illness inspired **Chancellor Norman Lamm** to called him a "legend." At YU, Mr. Butler became involved in student government, never complaining about "schlepping an oxygen tank from class to class," according to his mother. During the summer while in college, Mikey volunteered at a camp for children with special needs. He was active in the National Council of Synagogue Youth. He learned to play the drums.

From the time he was born, he bucked the odds. Soon after birth, doctors gave Mr. Butler little more than an hour to live. He lived 24 years, a time span, said Chancellor Lamm, filled with more achievement than the average lifetime.

■ NOBEL PRIZE WINNER DANIEL KAHNEMAN delivered YU's Alexander Brody Distinguished Service Lecture in Economics on Feb. 3 on the Wilf Campus. Dr. Kahneman received the 2002 Nobel Prize in economic sciences for his groundbreaking work in integrating psychological research into

economics.

- THE DISTANCE LEARNING PROJECT, DEVELOPED by YU's Association of Modern Orthodox Day Schools and Yeshiva High Schools, was launched last month. The Project features a video-conferencing component and an Internet-based course management tool. These technologies allow students, teachers, and administrators to interact with experts and educators from all over the world, thus bolstering Jewish curriculum offerings and teacher training. Introduced to yeshiva high school teachers through a seminar at Azrieli Graduate School of Jewish Education and Administration, the Project is being piloted at five yeshiva high schools, including YU's Marsha Stern Talmudical Academy High School for Boys and others in Boca Raton, FL, Cleveland, OH, Monsey, NY, Toronto, Canada, and Seattle, WA.
