All YU Light Switches to be Replaced with Dimmer Switches

In a recent email to the Yeshiva University student body, President Rabbi Dr. Artie Bourbon announced that he has arranged to replace all of the light switches in all YU-affiliated buildings with dimmer switches.

“We are living in unprecedented times,” Berman stated in the email, “and in order to adjust, we must treat the transition back to campus life as a dimmer switch. I have been using this extremely clever metaphor for several months now, but I have come to worry that much of the student body feels removed from the metaphor. These dimmer switches will provide the visual aid we need

in order to fully understand the dimmer switch metaphor for these aforementioned unprecedented times.”

The dimmer switches will be installed across all buildings on March 4. In the email, Berman explained that this date was chosen because it will mark “a year since we have started getting increasingly, exponentially dimmer here at Yeshiva University.” Yeshiva University first closed its doors on the Wilf Campus on March 4, 2020, thus making this project occur on the one-year anniversary of the university’s first closure.

While Bourbon is optimistic

about this visualization of his metaphor, it requires the allotment of a budget that was previously unprecedented. “We didn’t originally set aside a dimmer switch budget, of course,” explained a named spokeswoman, “so we had to make some sacrifices. We will be taking some of the budget from the Studio Art department. After all, without an art floor, what do they need all that money for?”

Much to the dismay of Bourbon, however, he was not given authorization to establish dimmer switches in all of the buildings he had hoped. According to Brandy Orangebaum, chief facilities and administrative officer, “We have

authorization for the undergraduate buildings, sure, and even the graduate buildings and the dorms. But what about Chop Chop and Golan? I know they’re not actually our buildings, but I’d love to have them in on the adjustment. Meanwhile, Tiberias has been driving a hard bargain, but they’ll come around.”

It is the hope of Bourbon and the YU administration that establishing the dimmer switches throughout Yeshiva University will help the students and faculty to be mindful of his metaphor and its meaning.



SCW Students Trapped in Zoom Calls Twice in One Morning

Following some irregular Zoom activity earlier this week, on Thursday, February 30 at 1:00 p.m. EST, several Stern College for Women (SCW) students in Mr. Baskin’s “Introduction to Zoology” course were unable to leave their Zoom meeting.

As the end of class drew closer and students became more excited to embark on their weekend plans, some SCW students found themselves trapped in their last Zoom class of the day. One student, who wishes to remain anonymous, shared her experience with the YU Quarantiner, stating, “I tried to leave the Zoom meeting as I normally would after a long day of

Zoom calls, but found that I could not find the ‘Leave’ button on my Zoom tab. The professor already left the meeting, so we weren’t sure what to do.” The student expressed her gratitude when she was finally able to be rescued from the Zoom call, saying, “Baruch HaShem [Thank God] one of the women in the class was a Comp-Sci major, or we would have never gotten out.” The fourth year computer science major, who also wished to remain anonymous, explained the atmosphere of the Zoom call after Professor Baskin left as “something out of a documentary.” The same student continued to explain, “All my peers unmuted themselves and

all expressed the same hysteria... it was a simple technical fix and everyone immediately left the call once the problem was resolved.”

As the number of Zoom bombing incidents continue to rise, professors have been instructed to maintain strict security of their Zoom meetings. Professor Baskin commented, “I am new to this whole Zoom thing. I was told to download the highest form of security for the Zoom meetings, so I did... I didn’t realize that to ‘lock’ the Zoom meeting really meant students could not get out.”

Many students have expressed their concerns. “Not only are

we being threatened by Zoom bombings, but our own teachers can’t even figure out how to use to Zoom settings to the extent that students are being trapped in class,” shared one student.

Eric Yuan, CEO of Zoom, has not yet given a comment to the YU Quarantiner at the time of publication.

New YU Straight Panel Causes Controversy

Yeshiva University has generated much controversy with its allowance of the YU Straight Panel. Replicating the YU LGBTQ+ Panel which was held in December 2020, four straight students are to take stage and talk of their personal histories and their struggles with being straight in the Jewish Orthodox Community. It is to be held on June 9, Heterosexual PrideDay, and will be moderated by the renowned Ken Spero. A highlight of what to expect was sent out in an email to all Yeshiva University students:

"This panel will be a safe forum for the four members of the straight community to share their stories of struggling to be straight in a more 'woke' Jewish Orthodox world. While no Jewish Law will be discussed, and there will be a lack of political rhetoric, Ken Spero, the mensch himself, will be the moderator and is expected to add in his (unwarranted) input. The audience will be requested to pay an admission fee of \$5, which will be donated to the Menly Menches — a non-profit organization which teaches young men the Jewish Marriage Laws from the very beginning of their Torah study. If anyone has further questions, please contact yustraightpanel@mail.yu.edu."

There is student outrage on all campuses. Chava Nargilah (SCW '22) raged, "This is almost as infuriating as Moira Rose's Sunrise Bay character being killed off!" One anonymous YC '22 student complained, "Don't we have this all the time?!" One of the panel's supporters, an SCW '24 student, who heard this student's comment, responded with, "This panel is exactly what we need! It celebrates YU's diversity!" Which was met with the YC student's response, "Do you know the meaning of diversity?"

David Rose, owner of smalltown Schitt's Creek, will be leading a protest march in support of YU's LGBTQ+ community on May 18, 2021. A donation will also be made by Mr. Rose to the YU Counseling Center, in order to support all of the student's mental health.



People Getting Stuck In Elevators Long-Distance

A series of unfortunate events occurred on January 28, 2021 at 8:55 a.m. when 54 Stern College for Women students, across the country, got stuck in their buildings' elevators. As if in succession, each elevator stopped working and fire fighters took their time to arrive on scene. Arielle Baubam, SCW '25, who was stuck in an elevator on the Upper West Side, reported to the newspaper that "It was one of the scariest moments of my life but it wasn't the first time this has happened; I was stuck in the Stern College elevator not long ago. To be honest I should really move into and live inside the elevator, I'm allowed to stay there rent free." It seems that even from afar, Stern College has some maintenance issues that need to

be addressed.

YU staff member Professor Rebecca Shuckster commented on these recent elevator halts saying "This is why the students should come back to campus! You have a lower chance of catching COVID on our safe campus then you do getting stuck in an elevator. So some back to campus, and crowd the classrooms; we miss you!"

In the midwest, student Aly Broom, SCW '29, commented by saying, "At least when I'm stuck doing class in the elevator I don't have my screaming siblings around me, who needs Wifi when I have the comfort of silence..."

On the opposite side of the country Allie Baxabom, SCW '30, reported that she was "scared." This is all she shared on the matter. Her comment

alone to this newspaper showed that this was no ordinary incident. No one is safe, no matter which elevator they take, the Stern College elevator karma will follow them.

The Honorable Lord Avi Bauxman Esq., President of YU, sent an email to the school outlining the effects these incidents had on the students while pointing out a silver lining stating "in the darkness of the elevator, we need to look to the light. The light can only be dim if we make it dim so let us find our flashlight in these pressing times." Truly inspirational words from a motivating man.

The elevator company, ElevatorY Universe, refuses to comment on this matter.

YU Survey Indicates that 75% of Students Do Not Know What Their Professors Look Like

A survey conducted by the administration of Yeshiva University found that 75% of their students did not know what their professors or instructors looked like.

The survey was initially sent to the student body on both Beren and Wilf Campuses via the student email list on November 15 of last year, the official President Rabbi Dr. Ari Berman day. However, after learning that students could not find the survey amongst the myriad of emails sent to them daily at arbitrary times, the administration had to resend the survey on November 31, 2020 to ensure a significant number of responses.

Exactly three months after President Rabbi Dr. Ari Berman day, the results were collected and analyzed by the students in the Business Statistics course that consisted of freshmen from the Sy Syms School of Business on Wilf Campus, Yeshiva University's most valued numbers experts. Approximately 75% of the respondents

claimed that they were unable to recognize and identify their own professors. While only 37.29% of the Beren students claimed their inability to recognize their professors, the Wilf students' responses were at 89.69%.



34.35% of respondents claimed that their inability to recognize their instructors was due to their lack of motivation to look at their

Zoom meeting window, whereas 52.91% said it was due to the immodest implications of looking at their instructors face and the remaining 12.74% of students stated that their teachers' have not figured out how to turn on their

"incredibly taxing because of the high expectations of looking at my professors and when I walk through the halls of the school buildings, I always get nervous because of the responsibilities involved in being able to recognize them and having a conversation with them. After five semesters of being a full-time YU student, they shouldn't expect students to have to look at their professors for the full semester that they take the course."

Another student, a lower junior, described having a fear of looking at their professors' faces and said that she "was required to be watched by my parents in the case that I throw my laptop at the wall from fright."

In light of these unsettling results, the Yeshiva University administration refused to address questions as to what they will do about this issue, and declined to give a comment to the YU Quarantiner.

The Batei Midrash Will Remain Open!

STUDENT COUNCIL TRUST BUSTS SHAYNDIE HIMSZAGE'S CLUB MONOPOLY

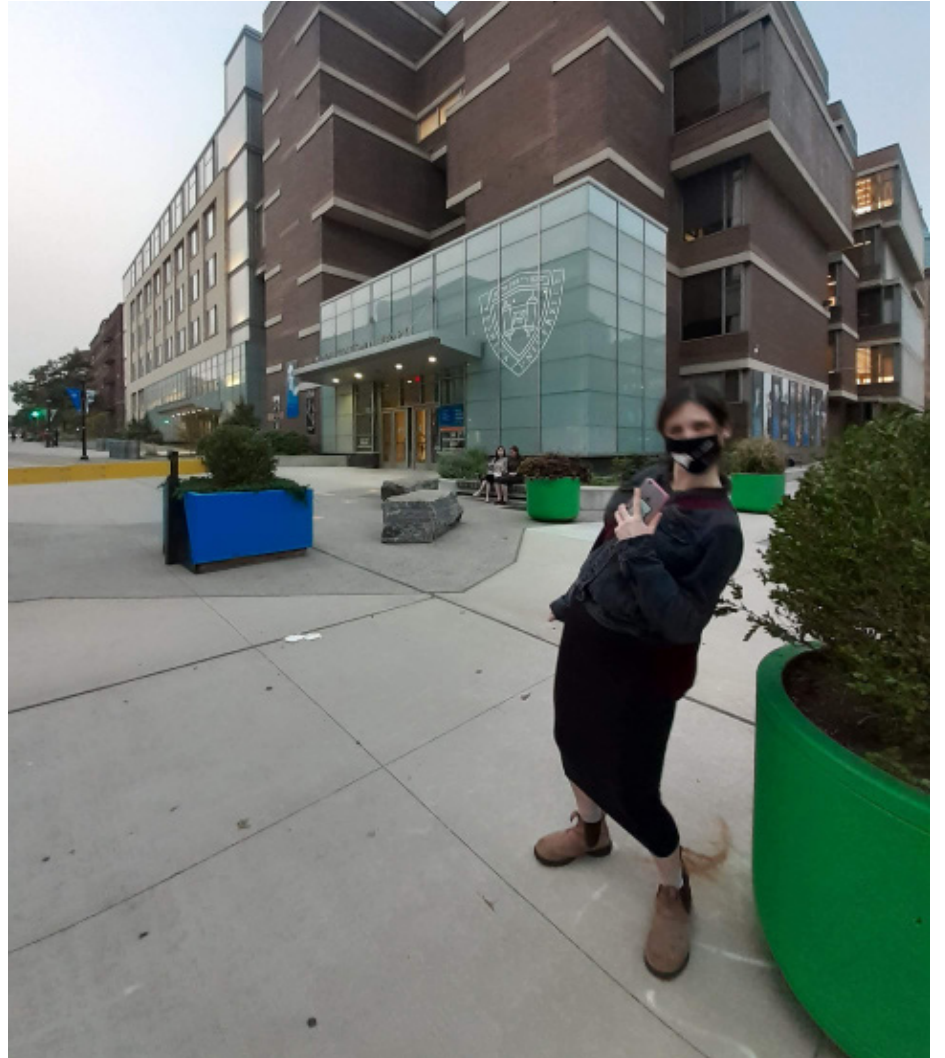

Just a year ago, a Sy Syms School of Business student on the Beren Campus was able to make an advising appointment using the same link as the one used for a Stern academic advisement appointment. However, our world recently changed. With Yeshiva University going online due to the pandemic there also came changes from the Sy Syms advising team. Shortly after in person classes were cancelled, the whole Sy Syms advising team met with students to discuss how to best advise Sy Syms students during this difficult time. One advisor who has always found it hard to work on both campuses and is never able to remember which campus they are supposed to be at on which day, suggested a proposal for the advising team. She recommended to the

other advisors that Yeshiva University should just combine the two campuses for the business students, saying that it would be easier for scheduling and advising. In addition, she felt that all classes, Judaic and secular should be coed, which could help with staffing issues. She proposed that due to the complexity of the Judaic program on the Wilf Campus, the

women should join those programs, and that morning

shiurim (classes) should therefore plan accordingly. Although staff refused to respond to the *YU Quarantiner's* request for a comment, the *YU Quarantiner* can confirm that the advising team has officially made the decision to allow Sy Syms

The women were told to make another account

on this website and then they could

make an advising appointment as normal. However, what the email did not inform the students was that when one chooses a time, date and advisor, the sign up would look different it had in the past. Each student is required to answer the field of which morning pro-

gram they are a part of with "Beren Student" not given as an option. When a Beren student went to make her appointment, she expressed frustration that the reason she wanted to set up an appointment was to discuss her Fall 2020 classes but now she had to discuss just which morning program would be right for her because she could not choose classes without this information. "I did not learn Talmud in seminary but I'm a very serious student and think YP would hashkafically be right for me," she explained, "I really love the class options and flexibility of IBC but was wondering if the negative reputation also would apply to a woman who takes part." Going further she said, "I would love to get credit for going to *minyan* (prayer quorum) but currently Stern does not have a morning *minyan*."

ties to potentially enhance the college experience, but should go towards things we do not actively need, like new YU flags or statues.

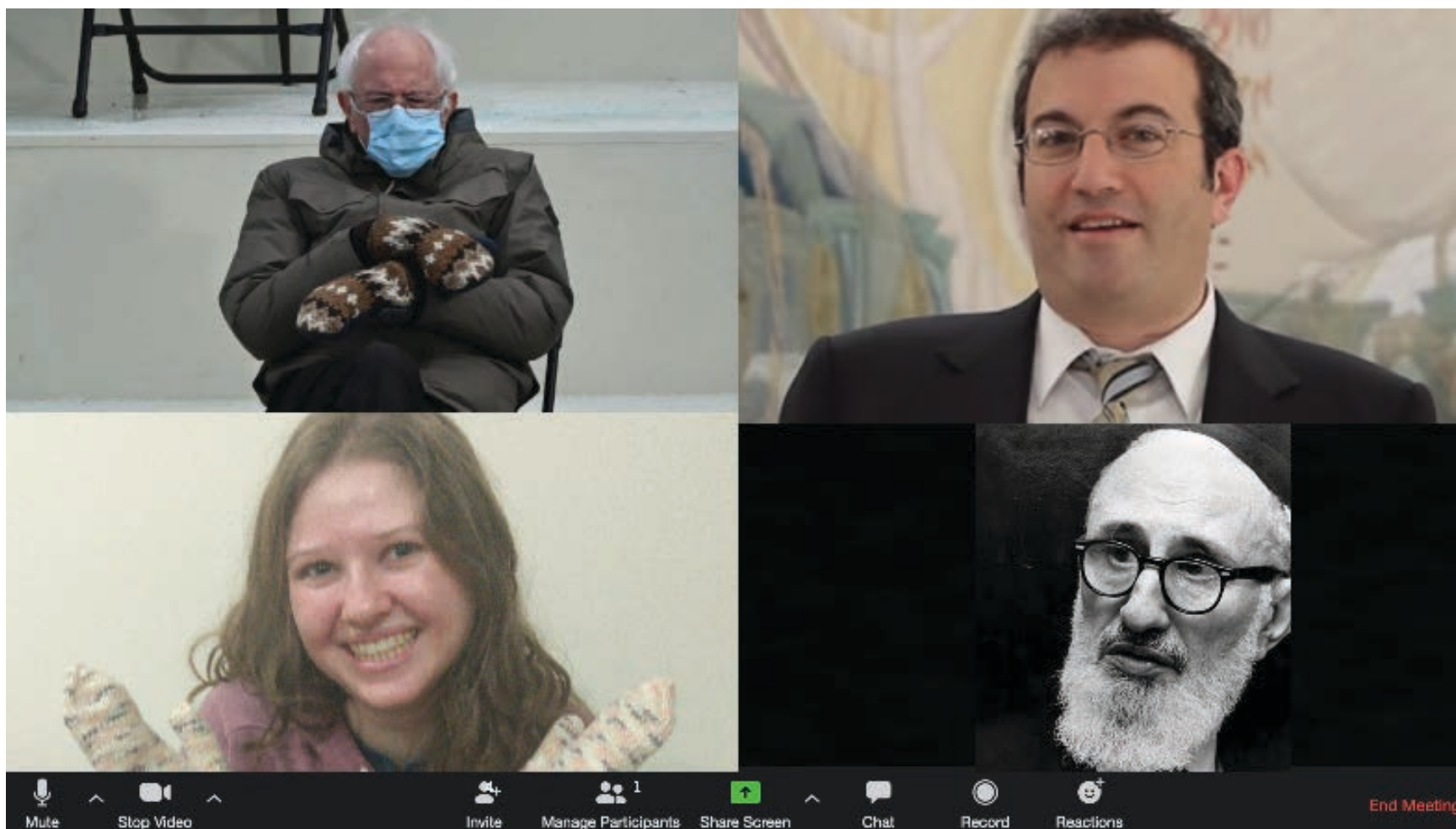

A Sociological Study of the Male COVID Spit Testing Competition

And yet, everyday while working in YU's COVID monitoring program, I am newly astonished by the tension that builds in the testing rooms. A recent study of YU's COVID-19 monitoring program has revealed the fascinating sociological premises for this occurrence.

As a member of the monitoring program's staff, I assisted in organizing this study. Hiding inconspicuously behind my face shield, I am forgotten by the boys who arrive to take their tests, allowing me to observe their behavior unnoticed. After a quick reminder to grab a wipe, these bochorim (young men) pass me by into the rooms, and take their seats. The competition then begins.

The average conversation commences along the following lines:

"Mendy, when did you get here?" — This question is important, as the newly arrived student needs to know whether it's worth it to try to compete. If the other student has been there too long, the bochor will choose to compete verbally

instead of physically.

"A couple minutes ago, but I'm almost done already. My time is down to 2 minutes and 45 seconds." — This seems to be too late in the game for our Yeshiva bachur. If he was only a minute behind, he might have been able to manage it. He can blame this on the registration staff, who may have been watching Jane the Virgin.

"Nice. I actually got my time down to a minute and a half." — With this reply, our student accepts the challenge. The game is now afoot. The tension is crackling in the air. The boys are sitting at attention, with strained faces as they try to gather their saliva.

"Ah, but are you saving up?" — A very important question. There are a few kinds of speed spitters who come to COVID testing. Some have trained in the arts of watching food videos and chewing on their tongue, while others have learned to store saliva in their cheeks like a chipmunk. As long as a student can tell the registration staff their name and date of birth without drooling, the chipmunk technique works. Students with different spitting tactics can't always compete.

In order to ascertain whether these students feared the competition or were just not ready to partake, an experiment was performed where certain students were told what to do to speed up their spitting, and then watched the next week to see if there was an increase in competition participation. This study found that the students continued to express the same complaints about spitting, and they did not seem to remember the advice given when it was repeated. 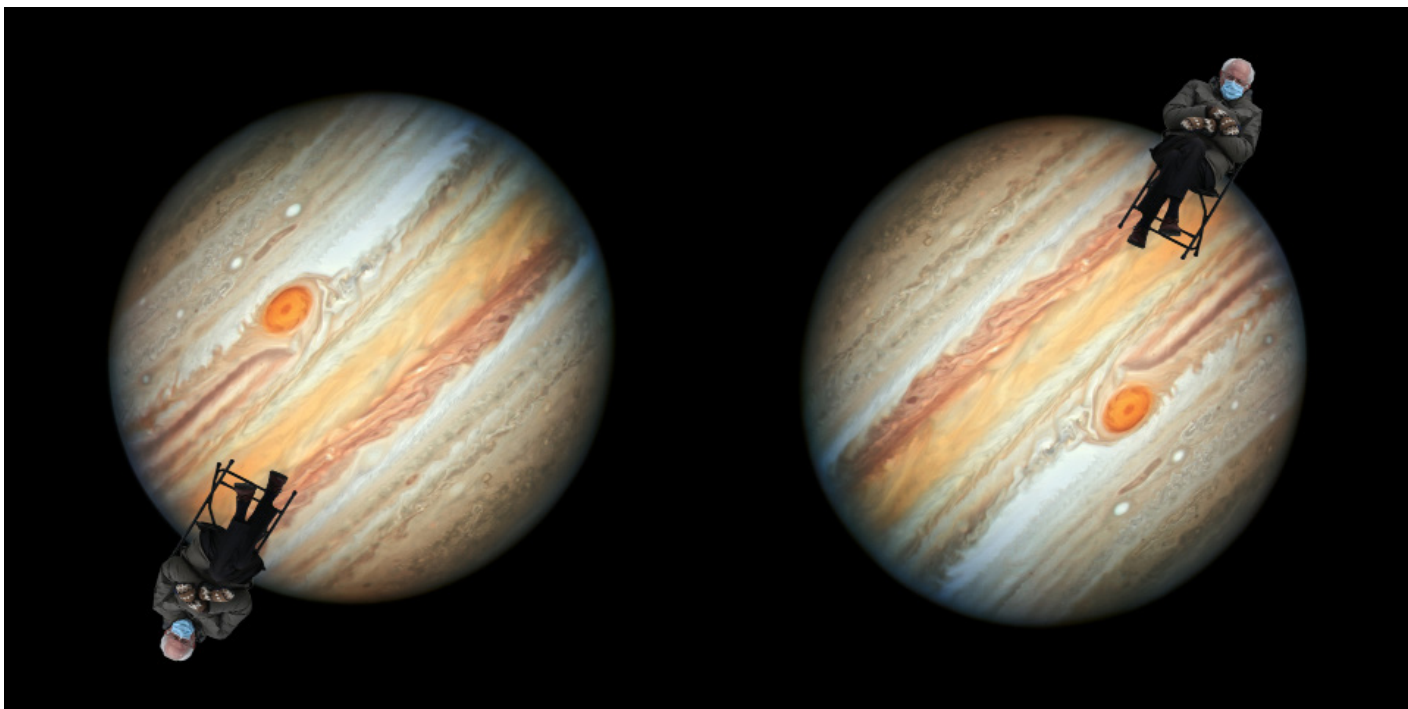

Emunah is Found to be Antiviral, Rendering Masks Useless for Roshei Yeshiva

Following the recent vaccination of two Yeshiva University Roshei Yeshiva, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) conducted a study in antibodies and immunity in rabbis using a sample size of 613 Roshei Yeshiva from various institutions.
