

Torat Chesed Mission to Ukraine

From March 13 to March 20, twenty-seven YU undergraduates, along with Rabbi Dr. Ari Berman, President of Yeshiva University, went to Vienna as part of the Torat Chesed Mission organized by Dr. Erica Brown of the Sacks-Herenstein Center to provide humanitarian relief to Ukrainians fleeing the war. Wolfgang Sobotka, President of the Austrian National Council, welcomed President Berman to speak at the Hofburg Palace, the seat of the Austrian government, and later commended YU students on their charitable work. To continue the work of the mission, the students have raised over \$100,000 to help the community, inspiring Center founders Terri and Andrew Herenstein to match what our students collected.
