## **Our Philosophy:**

Language is by imitation. Imitation is achieved by contact. That's how you learn your first language. When you use your native language, you don't make up your own grammar, vocabulary and pronunciation. You use the same grammar, vocabulary and pronunciation as people around you. You learn the rules of your language by constant contact with the language, first orally then by way of reading increasingly more elaborated textual data. The more one is exposed to a textual variety – the more one becomes familiarized with the linguistic foundations of a language, whether first, second, or third, and so does one's ability to use it accurately in speech or in writing.

We, the Hebrew faculty at Stern College for Women, believe in the natural process of language acquisition and on all levels of Hebrew instruction try to help you become familiarized with a growing vocabulary and internalize the rules of using words properly and accurately by way of paying close attention to the way Hebrew creates a meaningful expression. Our focus is greatly on INPUT. We believe that we can help you progress in Hebrew by close contact with various texts: by showing you how to assess new the linguistic data, look closely at the ways words are tied together to create a comprehensive sentence, a paragraph, and finally a complete textual unit.

#### Goals:

This course is designed to help students develop high level thinking strategies and active participation in analyzing Hebrew textual data, evaluating it and applying it inside and outside the classroom.

#### **Objectives:**

- 1. Introduce students to a variety of Hebrew texts and develop a constructive approach to reading and analyzing increasingly complex Hebrew written materials.
- 2. Vocabulary enlargement with a focus on words' use in context.
- 3. Development of grammatical skills required for Hebrew text analysis.
- 4. Development of communicative skills, both oral and written.

#### Course Structure and Materials:

This course is conducted entirely online, which means you do not have to be on campus to complete any portion of it. You will participate in the course using Yeshiva University's learning management system called **CANVAS** (https://yu.instructure.com/).

The course is divided into 6 study units. Each unit is divided into 4 instructional segments. All course materials are designed for self-study allowing you to work on your own time, within a given time frame in accordance with the course schedule (see below). You will have to follow due dates carefully and make sure your assignments are ready for submission on time!

The class will meet via Zoom during the 3rd day allocated for each unit for clarifications, live conversation, and a proctored writing assignment.

- Announcements will be posted in Canvas on a regular basis and will appear in your Canvas email
  inbox. Please make certain to check them regularly, as they will important
  information/reminders about upcoming assignments and other matters concerning the course.
- Make sure to submit your assignments on Canvas and NOT by email message.
- Students must download a Hebrew keyboard into their computers and learn to type in Hebrew.<sup>1</sup>



### ASSIGNMENTS, QUIZZES, AND EXAMS

- Each unit of the course follows a similar Schedule of Activities.
- 6 Units are divided into and equivalent of 4 classes. Each portion requires ~ 120 minutes work (= 75 minutes class work + 45 minutes homework.)
  - 1. 6 self-study narrated Power Point Presentation designed to develop your reading comprehension skills and grammatical analysis of Hebrew textual data.
  - 2. short writing assignment to be posted handed under "assignments" on Canvas
  - 3. 6 multiple choice quizzes
  - 4. 3 summary recordings to be handed in, your choice of 3 units out of 6.

    All quizzes will be administered on Canvas at the beginning of class time on the date indicated in the unit's schedule of activities.

## All quizzes should be taken without notes and/or translation.

- 5. Zoom meetings include: Proctored quiz, unit review, discussion, and/ or written assignment. The assignments may occasionally be proctored and must be written with no internal or external help.
- The midterm and final exams will be administered on TopHat. The exams will reflect the skills you have acquired in reading comprehension of Hebrew texts, your ability to read a Hebrew text analytically, and write a short essay on a related topic. Note that TopHat does not allow the use of a virtual keyboard so it is advisable to begin typing all course assignment on the computer from the beginning of the semester.
