Katz School Begins Taking Extreme Measures To Recruit Students

Students in Yeshiva University's undergraduate schools were in for a surprise when they entered the lobby of 245 Lexington and Furst Hall on Monday morning. Representatives from the Office of Admissions at YU's Katz School of Science and Health had set up shop at tables to recruit



potential students as usual, but it was clear their strategy had become extreme.

Banners displayed at the tables read alarming slogans like, "Please Just At Least Apply. We're Desperate And Will Soon Have To Start Accepting Syms Students" and "Go to our school or we will ****ing kill your family."

Admissions officers also reportedly became violent, throwing pens and PopSockets at students who did not stop by the table for more information. One Stern student reports that a Katz employee began throwing cash at her, yelling "we will pay you to come here".

"It was frightening," said Jack Goldberg (YC '21). "I'm a sophomore, so I'm not even eligible to apply, but now I'm part of the Katz Quantitative Economics program because I was afraid for my life."

The Katz School, which only recently opened, has programs in Biotechnology, Economics, Speech Pathology, Math, and other subjects. Located on the Beren Campus, classes take place in the evenings. Certain application requirements are waived for YU undergraduate students, but the Office of Admissions recently announced that YU undergrads could forgo the application all together and simply email "ok" to katz@yu.edu in order to enroll for Fall 2019. The GPA requirement for YU students was also

lowered to a 0.5.

So far, Katz's last-ditch efforts have been successful. The application rate among undergraduate students at YU has increased 250% since Monday's new strategy.

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Next YAF at YU Free Speech Event To Feature David Duke

YAF, or Young America's Foundation, a rightwing political club at YU, recently announced that their next big event, taking place in May, will feature David Duke. In the past, the club has brought in speakers like Ben Shapiro and Dennis Prager; club presidents are anticipating that the Duke event will be their biggest one yet.

Duke is known for his extremist views, but YAF board member Anna Colter believes his rhetoric is important for YU students to hear. "Snowflakes on this campus are obsessed with political correctness," she said. "It would do them some good to hear from a speaker who believes their religion controls the media and federal government."

Though there was backlash against Shapiro's and Prager's speeches on campus, Colter does not anticipate any disagreement with what Duke will speak about in May. "If you're a conservative, like many people on this campus are, everything he says is pretty much mainstream and commonplace."

Despite Duke's ties to the Ku Klux Klan, many students do not feel his presence would be threatening, even on a Jewish campus. "One of YAF's core beliefs is free speech, and everyone has a right to share their opinion," said Colter's co-board member Carlson Tucker. "But if any libtards try to complain, I'm going to shut them down immediately."

"THE ELEVATOR SHUTDOWN": STERN LAUNCHES NEW INITIATIVE TO GET STUDENTS TO LOSE WEIGHT

Stern College has shut down their elevators forcing students to take several flights of stairs to class and skip their snack breaks.

For the past 3 weeks, if Stern student Sarah Katz* wanted to have any hope of getting to her classes on time, she has had to leave her dorm half an hour before classes start. Why?
