YCDS HISTORY

The Yeshiva College Dramatics Society as we know it today opened its 1965 season with Twelve Angry Men under the expert direction of its then new advisor, Dr. Anthony S. Beukas. Since then, each of the Society's productions has been open to the public and each has been viewed by thousands of people.

YCDS's status as one of the most respected and popular activities on campus is a result of a 40-year evolution of dramatics in Yeshiva from a club to a society, and finally a two-credit course in the undergraduate curriculum of Yeshiva College. This success is the direct result of the outstanding talent, enthusiasm, and enduring effort of Dr. Beukas, the Society's founding director and mentor. In addition, with the encouragement of the late Dr. Abraham Tauber, former chairman of the Yeshiva College Speech Department, a Speech and Drama major was instituted in Yeshiva College. This major currently includes such course offerings as Theater Arts, Art of the Actor, Techniques of the Director, and Theater Workshop.

The 1980's were years of great physical growth for the Society. With the assistance of the Yeshiva University Women's Organization, professional stage lighting was purchased. Mr. Jay Blazer, the previous Director of YU Facilities Management, was instrumental in the acquisition of permanent theater seating. The Society's twentieth season was enhanced by the addition of a lighting control board, thanks to the generosity of the Socol family. The Society's twenty-fifth anniversary season was celebrated with the opening of their new home in the Schottenstein Theater.

In 1997, the Schottenstein Theater was renovated. With the help of the Yeshiva University Women's Organization, new lights were purchased. A new sound system was installed due to efforts of the Governing Board of YCDS. YCDS has entered the 21st century with this state of the art technology.

This semester's production of NEWSIES, the sixth production directed by Lin Snider, current YCDS Faculty Advisor, promises to maintain the tradition set by Dr. Beukas and the society, making each show better then the one before.

The Yeshiva College Dramatics Society marks the close of every season with a warm and festive Awards Night buffet. All YCDS members and friends are invited to this eventful evening where tribute is paid to the outstanding devotees of recent productions. Awards are presented to the best lead, supporting, and "gypsy" actors and to outstanding "techies". New members of the Chi Pi chapter of the Alpha Psi Omega Honor Society are inducted and the incoming governing board members are inaugurated.

Alpha Psi Omega

Alpha Psi Omega was founded in 1925 as a national honorary dramatics fraternity to recognize and reward all aspects of student participation in university and college drama productions. There are over five hundred campus chapters across the country with membership totaling over 50,000 members.

The Chi Pi-Yeshiva Chapter of Alpha Psi Omega was granted its charter in May of 1973. Twenty-two charter members were inducted on May 7, 1973, at a formal ceremony held at Yeshiva College. Since then induction ceremonies have been held annually with the Chi Pi membership reaching over 500 members to date.

To be considered eligible for induction into Alpha Psi Omega, a student must show dedication to drama and must earn a minimum of fifty points, awarded for participation in various aspects of Dramatics Society work, including production, technical assistance, and acting.

ABOUT THE DIRECTOR LIN SNIDER



LIN SNIDER is a professional singer/actress who has performed in cabaret, TV, film, and primarily on stage in regional theaters, Off-Broadway and in the National Tour of Anything Goes with Mitzi Gaynor. She has also worked at The American Academy of Dramatic Arts, NYU, SUNY/Purchase, Manhattanville College, as a director, musical director, and teacher of voice, acting and musical theater. She holds an M.F.A. in Acting from Brooklyn College and also studied at HB Studios and the William Esper Studio in NYC. She is currently teaching drama and speech at the Spring Valley High School, directing a production of CATS at the Amadeus

Conservatory of Music and musical directing a production of GUYS AND DOLLS at the Green Meadow School. Her new musical, CHANGE REACTION, had its world premier in the summer of 2006 and is currently being considered for new productions and publication. She performed in TEN NIGHTS IN A BARROOM last summer in Manhattan with the Out-of-the-Box Theatre Company. She is very proud to be directing her sixth production at YCDS.

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

When some of the guys proposed the idea of doing NEWSIES this fall, I felt excited and a bit dubious about attempting a full-fledged musical with YCDS. My hesitation was not at all the level of talent or commitment of the members, but thinking of the tasks involved in musical directing, choreographing, etc. in addition to modifying a script written as a screenplay for a cast of thousands to a play script for a cast of 19! But from the beginning multiple blessings have been bestowed on this production. New YCDS Board members have forged a closer relationship between the Board and the production. Josh Eckman as stage manager, Josh Gottesman as choreographer, Professor Blatner as musical director, returning alums helping with costumes, sets and fight choreography and Dodi Hecht as dramaturg have made contributions beyond my dreams. And beyond that, new guys appeared from nowhere to play in the band, help with all aspects of production and become members of the cast, joining the many returnees, lead by Danny Hoffman, who have served as wonderful role models of professionalism and creativity.

So, we began work. And as I became more familiar with the script and score, I fell in love with the music and the story of this show. How wonderful to be able to portray such an inspiring, but often overlooked, piece of history where a group of ragtag boys literally stopped New York City and caused the retraction of its illegal and despicable child labor practices. Also, the story is full of heart-warming characters who grow in

self-respect and strength as they confront and topple the power brokers of the city. And, the icing on the cake is the music, which is evocative and engaging and adds such richness to the production.

ABOUT THE SET

Newsies is set in New York City in the summer of 1899. The main stage is used as a general playing area and represents various locations in New York City including the Newsies Square, the Brooklyn Pier, a Manhattan Restaurant, the Irving Hall Theater and the basement of the New York World as well as random streets and alleyways of the Lower East Side of Manhattan. The upper platform stage right represents Pulitzer's office while stage left is the Jacobs' apartment. Far stage right is the dressing room of Medda the Magnificent, the greatest star of the Vaudeville stage, while far stage left is the Refuge, a prison for children.

THERE WILL BE ONE TEN MINUTE INTERMISSION BETWEEN ACTS

All accessories used in the production of Newsies including hairpieces, costumes, and food, are in strict accordance with Jewish tradition.

Taking pictures, operation of recording devices, eating, and smoking in the theater are strictly forbidden.

Please turn off all cellphones, radios, and paging devices during the show.

THE HISTORY BEHIND NEWSIES

The musical NEWSIES is loosely based on actual historical events. In 1898, in response to skyrocketing sales due to the Spanish American War, newspapers throughout the US raised the wholesale price of their papers. In other words, the price for newspaper sellers (newsies) was raised from 50 cents for 100 papers to 60 cents for 100 papers. The newsies didn't mind, though, because they sold the papers for 1 cent each and, with such a popular topic as the war, and multiple daily editions to sell, they were making money.

Eventually, the war ended and most papers slowly reduced their wholesale price back to the original ½ cent per paper. However, William Randolph Hearst and Joseph Pulitzer kept the prices of their papers (The NY Morning Journal and NY World, respectively) where they were. So, on July 19, 1899, the newsies in Manhattan went on strike. The strike quickly spread through NYC and beyond. On July 24 the newsies hosted a rally at New Irving Hall and, though the hall only held 2000, there were 5000 newsies there that night, overflowing into the streets.

The newsies would not give up, despite multiple setbacks. Finally, on August 2, 1899, the strike ended. The negotiated compromise did not involve any change to the price. Instead, the papers agreed to implement a new policy: they would buy back any unsold papers at the end of the day. In the past, newsies had faced the daily risk of being left with unsold papers so this was actually quite a victory for them.

The newsies strike was one of many child-labor-related strikes that occurred during the end of the 19th century and beginning of the 20th century. With the Industrial Revolution in full swing (not to mention the recent emancipation of slaves), there was a National need for a cheap and easily exploitable workforce. Poor, abandoned and orphan children – children of immigrants, former slaves, and the poverty stricken working class – were perfect. In the same year as the newsies strike, bootblacks and messenger boys also went on strike to protest unfair working conditions. In ensuing years, women and girls working in the garment district would strike as well, as would children working in the mills and mines throughout the US. Simultaneously, an underlying battle to completely abolish child labor and improve overall working conditions was growing and gaining power. It was not an easy fight but, at long last, in 1938, the US Federal Government passed the Fair Labor Standards Act, a law that restricted, by age and number of hours, the work a child could be hired to do.

Historical Note: Certain aspects of the play are a product of artistic license. At the time of the newsies strike, Joseph Pulitzer was practically bedridden and would not have been actively involved in any negotiations. Jack Kelly and David Jacobs did not exist; real leaders of the strike included: Kid Blink, Racetrack Higgins, Crutch Morris and a boy named David Simons. Newsies really did live at a lodging house on Duane Street where they paid for room and board and enjoyed access to spiritual and educational facilities. As far as we know, NY newsies did not actually sing and dance through the streets of Manhattan but history may be mistaken on this point.


Yishai Barkhordari (production assistant): Hiva. Yishai here. After four semesters of being an actor I finally cracked. I know what vou're thinking -that
