YCDS HISTORY

The Yeshiva College Dramatics Society as we know it today, opened its 1965 season with "Twelve Angry Men" under the expert direction of its then new advisor, Dr. Anthony S. Beukas. Since then, each of the Society's productions have been open to the public, and each has been viewed by thousands of people.

YCDS's status as one of the most respected and popular activities on campus is a result of a 40-year evolution of dramatics in Yeshiva University from a club to a society, and finally a two-credit course in the undergraduate curriculum of Yeshiva College. This success is the direct result of the outstanding talent, enthusiasm, and enduring effort of Dr. Beukas, the Society's founding director and mentor. In addition, with the encouragement of the late Dr. Abraham Tauber, former chairman of the Yeshiva College Speech Department, a Speech and Drama major was instituted in Yeshiva College. This major currently includes such course offerings as Theater Arts, Art of the Actor, Techniques of the Director, and Theater Workshop.

The 1980's were years of great physical growth for the Society. With the assistance of the Yeshiva University Women's Organization, professional stage lighting was purchased. Mr. Jay Blazer, the previous Director of YU Facilities Management, was instrumental in the acquisition of permanent theater seating. The Society's 20th season was enhanced by the addition of a lighting control board, thanks to the generosity of the Socol family. The Society's 25th anniversary season was celebrated with the opening of their new home in the Schottenstein Theater.

In 1997, the Schottenstein Theater was renovated. A new sound system was installed due to efforts of the Governing Board of YCDS. YCDS has entered the 21st century with this state of the art technology.

This semester's production of "1776", the 12th production directed by Lin Snider, current YCDS Faculty Advisor, promises to maintain the tradition set by Dr. Beukas and the society, making each show better than the one before.

The Yeshiva College Dramatics Society marks the close of every season with a warm and festive Awards Night buffet. All YCDS members and friends are invited to this eventful evening where tribute is paid to the outstanding devotees of recent productions. Awards are presented to the best lead, supporting, and "gypsy" actors and to outstanding "techies". New members of the Chi Pi chapter of the Alpha Psi Omega Honor Society are inducted and the incoming governing board members are inaugurated.

Alpha Psi Omega

Alpha Psi Omega was founded in 1925 as a national honorary dramatics fraternity to recognize and reward all aspects of student participation in university and college drama productions. There are over five hundred campus chapters across the country with membership totaling over 50,000 members.

The Chi Pi-Yeshiva Chapter of Alpha Psi Omega was granted its charter in May of 1973. Twenty-two charter members were inducted on May 7, 1973, at a formal ceremony held at Yeshiva College. Since then induction ceremonies have been held annually with the Chi Pi membership reaching over 500 members to date.

To be considered eligible for induction into Alpha Psi Omega, a student must show dedication to drama and must earn a minimum of fifty points, awarded for participation in various aspects of Dramatics Society work, including production, technical assistance, and acting.

1776: HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

When one hears the phrase "Founding Fathers" many terms come to mind; revolution, democracy, patriots, visionaries, heroes, etc.. However, one word that seemingly never comes up is men. That is where 1776 by Sherman Edwards comes in. 1776 is not a play about idealist patriots who had no faults and were way ahead of their time; rather it is a story about a group of men making extraordinarily tough choices under the most difficult of circumstances.

The show is set primarily in what is now known as Independence Hall in Philadelphia (which was then the house of the colonial legislature). The plot revolves around the debates in the Second Continental Congress, regarding independence from England, which occurred in late-June and early-July of the year 1776. Two years earlier, the First Continental Congress met and drafted a letter to King George III outlining the many grievances the colonies had regarding the stifling taxes that had been imposed on them beginning in the 1760's. Additionally, the First Continental Congress called for the convening of a second congress in 1775 to address what they had hoped would be a positive response from the king. Unfortunately, their grievances were ignored and the American Revolution began before the Second Continental Congress could assemble. Although we do know that the subject of independence was discussed frequently from May 1775 (the opening of the Second Continental Congress) until July 1776, we know very few details about what actually happened at Independence Hall, as no official record exists. This is not surprising, as the discussion centered on the notion of committing treason against the king of England.

What we do know is that while these debates were raging, the war was not going well for the Continental Army, and had the British won the war, declaring independence would have meant certain death for anyone who had participated in the decision. This is the climate under which these men were forced to make a decision; should they openly commit treason against the king, or should they wait and see if they could reach some kind of agreement with their mother country.

Many of you may notice some inconsistencies between the history of the American Revolution and the events and characters in the play. These were done (mostly) by the playwright, and were done under the purview of artistic license. While this show is meant to portray the Founding Fathers in a new light, it is still a play, with entertainment as its main goal. So sit back, relax, and join us as we take a journey back in time to 1776.


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WHO'S WHO IN THE CAST AND CREW BOARD BIOS



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
