YCDS HISTORY

The Yeshiva College Dramatics Society as we know it today, opened its 1965 season with "Twelve Angry Men" under the expert direction of its then new advisor, Dr. Anthony S. Beukas. Since then, each of the Society's productions have been open to the public, and each has been viewed by thousands of people.

YCDS's status as one of the most respected and popular activities on campus is a result of a 40-year evolution of dramatics in Yeshiva University from a club to a society, and finally a two-credit course in the undergraduate curriculum of Yeshiva College. This success is the direct result of the outstanding talent, enthusiasm, and enduring effort of Dr. Beukas, the Society's founding director and mentor. In addition, with the encouragement of the late Dr. Abraham Tauber, former chairman of the Yeshiva College Speech Department, a Speech and Drama major was instituted in Yeshiva College. This major currently includes such course offerings as Theater Arts, Art of the Actor, Techniques of the Director, and Theater Workshop.

The 1980's were years of great physical growth for the Society. With the assistance of the Yeshiva University Women's Organization, professional stage lighting was purchased. Mr. Jay Blazer, the previous Director of YU Facilities Management, was instrumental in the acquisition of permanent theater seating. The Society's 20th season was enhanced by the addition of a lighting control board, thanks to the generosity of the Socol family. The Society's 25th anniversary season was celebrated with the opening of their new home in the Schottenstein Theater.

In 1997, the Schottenstein Theater was renovated. A new sound system was installed due to efforts of the Governing Board of YCDS. YCDS has entered the 21st century with this state of the art technology.

This semester's production of "12 Angry Men", the 14th production directed by Lin Snider, current YCDS Faculty Advisor, promises to maintain the tradition set by Dr. Beukas and the society, making each show better than the one before. "12 Angry Men" was chosen to celebrate 100 productions by YCDS.

The Yeshiva College Dramatics Society marks the close of every season with a warm and festive Awards Night buffet. All YCDS members and friends are invited to this eventful evening where tribute is paid to the outstanding devotees of recent productions. Awards are presented to the best lead, supporting, and "gypsy" actors and to outstanding "techies". New members of the Chi Pi chapter of the Alpha Psi Omega Honor Society are inducted and the incoming governing board members are inaugurated.

ALPHA PSI OMEGA

Alpha Psi Omega was founded in 1925 as a national honorary dramatics fraternity to recognize and reward all aspects of student participation in university and college drama productions. There are over five hundred campus chapters across the country with membership totaling over 50,000 members.

The Chi Pi-Yeshiva Chapter of Alpha Psi Omega was granted its charter in May of 1973. Twenty-two charter members were inducted on May 7, 1973, at a formal ceremony held at Yeshiva College. Since then induction ceremonies have been held annually with the Chi Pi membership reaching over 500 members to date.

To be considered eligible for induction into Alpha Psi Omega, a student must show dedication to drama and must earn a minimum of fifty points, awarded for participation in various aspects of Dramatics Society work, including production, technical assistance, and acting.

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

I am so proud to be a part of the celebration of the 100th production of YCDS! It is a tribute to the school that Yeshiva University has continued to support the arts through good times and bad and to offer the students the opportunity to enrich their lives through participation in the theater. I continually have the young men of YCDS tell me that they gain knowledge and experience through being a part of the YCDS family that they don't find anywhere else.

In honor of this occasion, I, for the first time, purposefully broke the tradition of never having YCDS repeat a show and decided to do a revival of what I thought at the time was the first YCDS production. However, we were recently given a binder of many of the programs from former productions and I did see that *Journey's End* was actually the first YCDS show and has been revived since. Even so, I am proud to present this play because of the many opportunities it provides these young actors.

12 Angry Men, once again, offers the students a chance to gain a deep understanding of and to immerse themselves in another time, this time post-World War II America. At that time conformity was king and Communism the enemy. In our class discussions about those times, the judicial system and the ordinary citizens who become the jury and who make such weighty decisions about people's lives, we have explored the many positives and potential pit-falls of having such power bestowed to the people. In the play, the values and beliefs of each character are revealed and the power of influence from one's peers and from society becomes a central issue. In looking at these issues in the lives of the characters, the student actors then become more aware of what they hold dear and of the effect of the society and people around them on their views and actions. Also, in terms of an acting experience, for all twelve actors to be onstage for the entire play is incredibly demanding and demands a level of concentration and ensemble work that is very challenging.

As always, there are too many people to name here who made this production possible, but I do want to particularly thank Rafi Skier, our Stage Manager, and Dov Adelson, our Assistant Stage Manager, and Evan Schwarzbaum, our President, for coordinating all of the elements of the show. I need to thank every student for their dedication, creativity, energy and good spirits, all of which make being a part of YCDS so special. I, of course, want to thank President Joel for acting in our production. The message of support his participation gives is invaluable.

12 ANGRY MEN HISTORY AND CONTEXT

The year is 1957. In this hot and sweaty jury room of a New York Court of Law, 12 angry men are discussing the verdict of a child (his race is unknown). After the first vote is finished, the count is 11 to 1 in favor of "guilty." This leads to a very difficult question. How is #8 able to successfully convince the other 11 men to change their vote? Is it possible that #8 is the only one who could see the many flaws in the prosecutor's arguments? Or, is he manipulating them with his use of logic and language tactics?

The play contains many references to the flaws of a jury. Some will say that jurors have "bleeding hearts." Others will say that the average juror isn't educated enough to assess certain complicated cases. And for many jurors, it will be "very hard to keep personal prejudice out of a thing like this." As the show goes on and you learn more about the case and the facts concerning it, be wary of the social dynamics between the characters.

Ultimately, we don't know if the kid killed his father. So after you have seen everything down to the final vote, only then shall you make your final decision regarding the verdict of the child.


