A DRAMATIC FIRST HALF

This year we celebrate the 50th year of theater excellence in Yeshiva since the inception of its program in 1965. How it happened is nothing short of a mystery, or perhaps an old western shootout. But after a half century and over one-hundred plays, we can now confidently

explain why so many different people appear in the audience on show night. Curious? Read on, especially the second to last sentence.

The Yeshiva College Dramatics Society, as the school's theater department is known today, opened its 1965 season with Twelve Angry Men under the expert direction of its founding advisor, Dr. Anthony S. Beukas. Our status as one of the most respected and popular activities on campus is a result of a 50-year evolution of dramatics in Yeshiva University, from a club to a society and then to a two-credit offering in the undergraduate Yeshiva College catalogue. Dr. Beukas found an ally in former chairman of the YC Speech Department Dr. Abraham Tauber, who instituted the Speech and Drama major at Yeshiva College.

The 1980's were years of great growth for the Society. The major included course offerings such as Theater Arts, Art of the Actor, Techniques of the Director, and Theater Workshop. YCDS acquired professional stage lighting and permanent theater seating. In our 20th season, the Society's productions were enhanced by the addition of a lighting control board thanks to the generosity of the Socol family. The Society's 25th anniversary season was celebrated with the opening of its new home, Schottenstein Theater. In 1997, the Schottenstein Theater was renovated and a new sound system was installed. We had settled down, perhaps, but were only just getting started.

In the early 2000's, fortune shined on YCDS when a professionally accomplished director, singer, actress, teacher and musician joined the Yeshiva College faculty. From cabaret through film, and of course theater, she had done it all: Lin Snider, our then-new faculty advisor, would go on to contribute more to the theater at YCDS than anyone could have imagined, including herself. Under Professor Snider's tutelage, the Society would perform some of its most memorable shows, including the unforgettable 1776, the last YCDS musical the school has enjoyed. It was around that time when the theater program saw its budget cut entirely--and then partially restored. A resilient student body would rally behind the theater and win back a reduced budget for the theater program. In 2012, the Society restaged the inaugural Twelve Angry Men.

This semester's production of The Boys Next Door, the 19th production Lin Snider has directed, promises to maintain the tradition set forth by founding director Dr. Beukas, making each show better than the one before. The spirit of community in "The Boys Next Door" also highlights the hallmark of a different era, making each show more inclusive than the one before, the tradition of the mentor we affectionately call Lin.

When seeking a stronger future, it sometimes seems easier to cut costs before assessing value. A more thoughtful and effective strategy considers a different approach—identifying and building upon existing strengths. The theater's educational and social impact affects the Society's members every single day, whether in rehearsal, at work on the crew, at a board session, or on the Shabbatons. Extraordinary dedication to the theater program in YC enrich our college experiences.

In 2015, most of the Society's funding, and faculty friends are sadly no longer. But the remarkable spirit of Yeshiva College drama in the last half century can still be found; it survives as the proud production of YC Theater Workshop, the Society's single remaining course. With an unprecedented spirit of cooperation and sacrifice, YCDS can still proudly state that which has always been true: the art, creative expression, and community fostered in this theater is something all of us--students, staff, faculty and administration of Yeshiva College--can proudly call our own. And that, friends, is why we all show up for show night.

I knew from the beginning that deciding to produce THE BOYS NEXT DOOR with YCDS was a risky choice. The content of this play requires a level of sensitivity and respect, from the

audience to the actors, from the Board to the crews, that is challenging on many levels. Yet, now that we are sharing the show with you, we feel confident that you will join us in loving these characters and in finding you have expanded your understanding of and empathy with this challenged population.

THE BOYS NEXT DOOR gives us a window into the lives of men with emotional and intellectual disabilities through moments of comedy and pain that mirror the lives of us all. For the cast, finding the connection with these characters and working to portray them honestly has been a journey of self-examination as well as an adventure into the lives of this population in our very city. Through the wonderful cooperation of THE AHRC, we visited a local group home similar to the one in which the characters of our play live. According to their website, THE ARHC is a "family governed organization committed to finding ways for people with intellectual and other developmental disabilities to build full lives as defined by each person and supported by dedicated families, staff and community partners." And we were welcomed into a home where the residents are clearly supported in their every endeavor to live fully within their limitations. Here the student actors found connections with people who taught us that we are all much more similar than different and with whom we have continued to meet and share experiences. And,



to our great honor, the entire group home of ten residents and staff then came to see our preview performance. What an enriching experience for us all!

And though you are just seeing actors portray people with these challenges, we hope you enjoy laughing and crying with them as they try to find meaning and joy in their lives.

As always, I must thank everyone who has worked so hard to make this show happen – so many faculty, administrators and young people behind the scenes who are a part of the YCDS family.

And, of course, we thank you so much for coming and supporting YCDS. Enjoy the show.

PRODUCER'S NOTES

Disability, Community, and Comedy?

The Boys Next Door is like no other play. A meaningful work that portrays individuals with developmental and psychological disorders by definition

requires highly sensitive acting. The play uncovers aspects of human nature that alters our conceptions of who is weak and who is strong. It also poses serious questions about moral and logistical decisions concerning the care of individuals in need of specialized social services.

As part of our journey with this play, we have sought out the real-life individuals our characters on stage represent and taken up their cause. The dramatics society has successfully partnered with Libenu, a not-for-profit Jewish organization that maintains group homes and provides vital services for Jewish adults with special needs in Chicago. The state budget for people with developmental disabilities and mental health challenges in Illinois ranks dead last in the entire U.S. The cause of Libenu must be embraced by the entire Jewish community, including that of the greater New York area. When we understand the importance of helping others, we do well to discover those for whom our support accomplishes more than usual.

Surprisingly at first, The Boys Next Door is unmistakably funny. Why? Simply because of the situational comedy that abounds when the boys next door, our characters, bring along their energetic, quirky and lovable personalities. Actors, crew and board have all developed a greater understanding of the people and subjects at the heart of the play. We hope you

share in our growth. Put simply, don't be afraid to laugh - we understand you are laughing with us and not at us. In fact, laughter for the right reasons represents the type of love and understanding that the boys next door and the men of Libenu truly deserve. But for those who feel strongly that the cause merits more than comedy, and more than sympathy, you will find YCDS in your corner. A contribution to Libenu would be the appropriate next step. DRAMATURGY OF THE BOYS NEXT DOOR

This play was first produced in the 1988/89 season and has garnered many strong opinions, both positive and negative. The playwright, Tom Griffin, clearly was attempting to shed light on the day-to-day lives of the individuals with mental and emotional challenges at a period in time when perspectives and methods of treatment of these populations were changing rapidly.

TREATMENT OF INDIVIDUALS WITH MENTAL ILLNESSES

By the mid-1960s in the U.S., many severely mentally ill people had been moved from psychiatric institutions to local mental health homes or similar facilities. The number of institutionalized mentally ill patients fell from its peak of 560,000 in the 1950s to 130,000 by 1980. By 2000, the number of state psychiatric hospital beds per 100,000 people was 22, down from 339 in 1955. In place of institutionalized care, community-based mental health care was developed to include a range of treatment facilities, from community mental health centers and smaller supervised residential homes to community-based psychiatric teams.

TREATMENT OF INDIVIDUALS WITH INTELLECTUAL CHALLENGES

In the early twentieth century the writings of Fernald, Davies, Deutsch, Haskell, Sloan, Wolfensberger, and many others contributed to our better understanding of the strange ideological deviation which for half a century prior had attributed to mentally retarded people the primary responsibility for all social ills, and characterized them as people from whom society must at all cost protect itself. We can trace the process by which the first humanitarian efforts of 1850 to educate the "poor idiot" and make him socially competent were transformed by 1915 into deliberate programs to "identify, segregate, and sterilize every feeble-minded person as a menace to social decency and racial purity: to the end that they shall not reproduce their kind." This language was typical of the statutory provisions for the control of feeblemindedness in many States well into the 1950's, elements of which still persist in some statutes today.

Since the mid-1980s, the trend in the U.S. has been for individuals with ID to live in inclusive community settings, with appropriate supports to facilitate their experience. In the 1980s and 1990s, the number of children diagnosed as intellectually disabled has dropped, partly as a result of increased early intervention, and also because of a more cautious professional outlook on definition and diagnosis

THE PLAY IN CONTEXT

Tom Griffin's attempt to bring the lives of these people onto the stage may be flawed, but THE BOYS NEXT DOOR, when seen with the appreciation of the playwright's motivation and the actors' attempts at portraying real human beings struggling through disabilities, can give us a rare window into the challenges and strengths of these people among us.

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
