responses ensued. "That's WONDERFUL," exclaimed Assistant Dean of Student and Everything Else Services Zeldia Braun/Brown/Whatever.


Mashgiach Ruchani Rabbi Tzvi Flaum responded to the donation by saying, "The proof of the pudding is..."

Due to "stresses and tensions of the office," Dean Norman Rosenfeld has announced his resignation from his fourteen year position as YC dean.


"We suggested he take two aspirin to relieve the stress and try a new exercise regimen," said Vice-President of Academic Affairs William Schwartz.

Miss TAC USA

The first Miss TAC USA pageant was a source of controversy among administrators and students.

The pageant, sponsored by SOY, TAC, SSSBSC and RIETS, was intended to encourage proper dress among SCW students. "By demonstrating that a woman in modest dress can attract a great deal of attention, and even win a beauty pageant, we hope to prove to students that our dress code, which is in accordance with Jewish law, is necessary and beneficial to the student body (no pun intended)," said Dean Koshier Meat (not Bacon).

Some students disagreed. "Competition is always a negative thing," said Former SCW Senior, Hunter graduate student Dara Aronson. "While the competition may encourage students to dress properly, its effect is most likely to be ephemeral."

Deans Koshier Meat and Orderin responded to claims the competition was "shallow." "This pageant is unusual because its focus is on inner beauty, and not externals," said Dean Orderin. "Our winner was the girl who had the most covered but yet emanated warmth and beauty."

The winner, Sarah Beila Rivka Ruchel Goldberg, will be TAC president during the 1995-1996 school year. "I thank G-d I won this award not because, chas veshalom, I believe beauty should be emphasized," said Goldberg. "I am glad that I can serve as a role model in the Jewish community."

Two New TAC Clubs: STUDS and Adopt a Hubby

TAC President, Sasha Bullet, introduced two new TAC clubs at last week's meeting. Due to the great student response to the "Adopt a Hubby" and "BLUDS" programs, TAC is venturing in a new direction this semester with clubs called "Adopt a Hubby" and "STUDS."

The "Adopt a Hubby" club has already attracted a large number of students interested in finding *shiduchim*. The program allows students to pair up with bachelors in the Manhattan area. The students visit these people at least twice a week. They can also go shopping with their adopted hubbys, go to the movies or have a quiet evening in a hotel lobby. The Stern volunteers basically attempt to fill the void in these people's lives and to simply be their companions.

"TAC's main goal is *hevel*," said Bullet. "While previously our clubs catered to helping the elderly or the infirm, 'Adopt a Hubby' benefits Stern students and the Jewish community as a whole."

"It's such a good feeling to be a part of this club" said club member Dara Aronson. "Not only do you feel as though you're help-

ing someone else, but you gain so much from it too."

The other new club called "STUDS" has barely gotten off the ground. The purpose of this club is to allow Stern students the opportunity to improve their learning skills. While the "BLUDS" program is *Ushma*, "STUDS" gives students an incentive. Students who are interested submit their names, a *sefer* of particular interest, as well as the type of guy they would like to be paired with (e.g. school in Israel). The committee heads then carefully examine each student's requirements and pair each student with a "STUD" from Yeshiva College.

"It's like killing two birds with one stone," said TAC VP Liz Jarret. "Since 'BLUDS' was such a success, why not push that type of program one step further?"

"We've finally found a way for Stern and YC students to meet under another guise," said Jarret. "Since most of the 'STUDS' are from MYP, I believe that our students will go far."


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The Search Committee, named for the searches that it conducts, has begun its search for a "torah u'madda" model to serve as the new YC dean.

Yogurt the Only Kosher thing in the Caf

In response to the recent uproar about food hashgachas in the SCW cafeteria, all foods were recently labeled with their hashgachas and their supervising rabbis. In the process, the discovery was made that all cafeteria items are no longer kosher, except for the frozen yogurt.

"It has come to our attention that there may be some questions regarding the kashrus of all food products in the cafeteria," said Cafeteria Supervisor Rabbi Yitzchak Vanilla. "We're working on correcting the problem, but in the meantime Stern students will just have to eat the yogurt."

In order to improve the variety, a new line of flavors will be introduced to supplement the current one. A selection from the new menu includes exotic flavors like "Diamond Disguise," "Elevator Exuberance" and "Dorm Delight," all of which were created by the Stern Yogurt Company.

Ethnic nights will still remain a part of the weekly menu. Foreign treats such as "Faux Pepperoni Pizza" for Italian Night, "Instant Mashed Potato" for Russian Night and "Oil-Fried Falafel" for Israeli Night will grace the yogurt menu.

This menu enhancement is necessary because even the yogurt toppings are under questionable supervision.

"You never know what you can find in a raisin or a nut these days," said Vanilla.

With the increase in flavor assortment comes the inescapable raise in price.

"Since yogurt is the only thing left on the menu, we may as well raise prices so people can use up the money on their cards," said Cafeteria Supervisor Mrs. Seltzer. "So,

instead of charging 25 cents per unit, we'll now be charging \$1.25 per unit."

Another benefit to the slash in the regular menu is the substantial amount of environmental waste the school will be able to avoid.

"This new system is really great because we can now save tons of money on paper goods. All we need to buy are the yogurt containers, lids, spoons and napkins. No more knives, forks and straws; no more ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise or duck sauce," said President of the SCW Environmental Awareness Club Desha Tree, SCW '99. "It's also environmentally beneficial because we're eliminating all the styrofoam waste of the hot meal containers."

The SCW Environmental Awareness Club approves wholeheartedly of the new idea, and intends to halt any potential plans for a return to the old caf way of life.

YC students are equally enthusiastic about the discovery at the midtown campus, because all money saved will go to help improve the uptown campus. A new dorm building will be built, complete with indoor tennis courts, racketball courts, sauna, whirlpool and jacuzzi.


With seven available phone lines to connect to "yu!" there should be no instances of busy signals, explained Computer Advisor Betty Gordon.

"Yes we are," said Kindehlerererer.



"No you are not," said Schwartz.

"It's clear the revelation of the three names was simply a way to gain controversy," said YC senior Don Care.


The Search Committee, named for its searches, is continuing to search for more information.

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

