THE primary purpose of the Harry Fischel School for Higher Jewish Studies is to promote advanced Jewish study and research through the instruction of a select group of graduate students. Students may choose from four major fields of study: Bible; Jewish History, Literature, and Philosophy; Rabbinic and Talmudic Studies; and Semitic Languages, Literatures and Cultures.

The Harry Fischel School brings together for two short summer terms rabbis, scholars, and community leaders who are unable to make use of these Yeshiva University special resources during the regular school year. While pursuing professional advancement, they broaden their understanding of a wide range of issues by exchanging ideas of mutual concern with the advice and assistance of recognized authorities. Small classes assure the maximum development of each student and the satisfaction of his specific needs. Students engage in individual research which enables them to contribute to Jewish knowledge and letters, and return to their communities as better informed and more effective leaders.

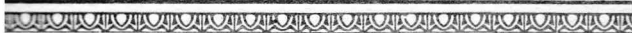

Programs lead to the degrees of Master of Hebrew Literature, Master of Arts, Doctor of Hebrew Literature, and Doctor of Philosophy.



FIRST SEMESTER

The First Semester begins on Monday, June 25 and ends on Thursday, July 19.

SECOND SEMESTER

The Second Semester begins on Monday, July 23 and ends on Thursday, August 16.

Classes meet four days a week, Monday through Thursday.

Registration will be held on Monday, June 18 through Thursday, June 21 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Friday, June 22 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in Room 237, Graduate Hall, Amsterdam Avenue and 186th Street, New York City.

A course consists of two hours per day for eight weeks (two semesters). Courses meeting for two hours a day for one semester count as half courses; those meeting for four hours a day for one semester count as full courses. Normally, students are allowed to take a maximum of one course, or two half courses during one semester. Accordingly, a course, or a year's work in a subject, may be completed in four weeks.
